Province of Nova Scotia.

HALIFAX ELECTION resulted in returning P. C. Hill, Esq., by a majority of 24 votes. The total number of ballots deposited was, for Hill 2157, and for Garvie 2133.

This is the first experience of the ballot for electing members to the Legislature. Although the voting was secret yet the friends of the respective candidates were no less active and earnest in looking up the voters, and bringing them to the polls. All was done quietly. Some excitement was apparent whilst waiting for the returns from the remote parts of the county. It was uncertain till Saturday night, which was elected. The declaration was made yesterday by the Sheriff.

It is said that there are no less than six candidates for legislative honors at the approaching election in Guysborough County.

HALIFAX AND DARTMOUTH SABBATH SCHOOL ASSOCIATION. The Annual meeting of the Halifax and Dartmouth Sabbath School Association was held in Salem Church on Wednesday evening. The President of the Association, Mr. Selden, occupied the chair. The Secretary, Mr. McNutt, read the returns of seventeen out of twenty-four schools, seven not having made returns. He also read the Annual Report of the Committee, from which it appears that the Association has been in operation five years; that the number of schools connected with the Association has increased during those five years from 12 to 24, the numbers of teachers from 247 to 450, and the number of scholars from over 1000 to over 3000. Great progress has also been made in other respects, in the increased efficiency of teaching and the establishment of teachers' meetings.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year:—President J. S. McLean, Vice President, R. N. Beckwith; Secretary, W. B. McNutt, Committee, Hon. S. L. Shannon and Messrs. J. Bell, J. Grierson, W. Roche, Jr., Charles Robson and James Farquhar. Three essays by lady teachers were read by the Secretary; subject—"The best way of developing in young persons a love for the study of the Holy Scriptures." All the essays were good, and the last particularly so. The history of the last and best essay was somewhat interesting. It was picked up some three weeks ago in the mud on Spring Garden Road, by a person who could not read, who on Wednesday evening, handed it to Mr. Grierson, from whom it passed into the hands of the Secretary. After the reading of the essays a few remarks upon the subject were made by Mr. Grierson and Mr. Joseph Bell. Mr. Grierson moved that the Secretary be requested to have the essays, or portions of them, published. After the collection the Dismissal Hymn was sung and the meeting was closed; the Benediction being pronounced by Rev. Mr. Elliott.—Chronicle.

SUPREME COURT.—The prisoners convicted at the present sitting of the Supreme Court were sentenced on Friday last. Boutiller, for arson, got five years in the Penitentiary; Riley, for larceny, one year; Medley, for stealing an ox, six months; Amos Mason, for stealing jewelry from Mrs. Cabot, one year; Kennedy and Brigley, for breaking into a shop at Margaret's Bay, six months each, and Ellen Spike, a colored woman, for concealing the birth of her child, six months in jail at hard labor.
