THE MURDER IN P. E. ISLAND.—A letter from in the "Telegraph," gives the following account last week. of the murder of Doyle at the North Cape, on the 2nd of August by Breen :-

"Doyle, it seems, had a fishing boat which, with the assistance of some neighbors, he was launching. After the launch a great treat was given, and Breen, who was present, wanted more liquor, and getting noisy, was put out of the fishing house or building, at the same time threatening Doyle that for that act he would have his life. Doyle, on going home that night Saturday, July 30th, being afraid of Breen, took a different route from his usual one, and also asked two of his neighbors to accompany him, and going along they heard a match set off and saw a man spring out of the bush and come up to them, "Is that you, Breen?" was asked. "That's myself," was replied, and raising a hoe which he had inside his coat, he head, laying him at his feet. "Take this struments. corpse home with you, and be off or I'll serve you the same," says Breen. The two men jumped to the fence for stakes to protect themselves with, and Breen left them. Doyle was carried to the nearest house, where he lingered for three days and then died, leaving a wife and three or four children. Breen stopped around until Doyle's death, and has not yet been caught, the people being afraid of him, and many preferring he would decamp. Thursday last he was at the West Cape enquiring if a boat was going over to Shediac.

Boiler Explosion in St. John, N. B.—On Saturday morning a steam-boiler in the Kirk & Worrall, mill, Portland, St. John, N. B., exploded with a terrible noise. At the time of the explosion three men were in the engine room, McAfee, the fireman, and a young man named Devenney, who was repairing the lock of a satchel, and his brother, who was oiling the engine. The two first named were standing in front of the work bench, one on either side of the vice, on a line with the inner sides of each window. The chief engineer, Samuel Devenney, senior, was not in the mill at the time with his two sons, but was on his way down. Suddenly, without warning, the crash came.

The men in the engine room had only time to raise their eyes to the windows before the wood work came crashing in, followed by the round head of one of the sawdust boilers, which had been blown out, clouds of steam, streams of boiling water, and flying bricks instantly filling the room. The two men at the bench were almost overwhelmed, Samuel Devenney being scalded and bruised in a dreadful manner. He now lies in a very precarious condition. His father, the chief engineer, with a presence of mind and cool courage, born of long experience and careful regard for life and property, rushed into the mill, and cut off the communications with the mill boilers, thus obviating and preventing a further and far more awful catastrophe, and saving the main building. Eight persons are named as killed or wounded.

PICNIC AT KENTVILLE.—A monster Union Sunday School Picnic of the Presbyterians and Wesleyans of Windsor, was held at Kentville on Tuesday. It was estimated that there were about eleven hundred people at the gathering, which was harmonious and satisfactory.

TRADE OF LIVERTOOL, N. S .- During the year ending 30th June, 1870, the Exports from Liverpool to Ports outside the Dominion of Canada amounted to \$ 23,058; Coastwise, \$90,000 : Total -- \$308,480. Imports from ports not included in Canada, amounted to \$123,058; Coastwise, \$193,000; Total-\$316,058. The amount of duty paid during the year was \$9469,72.

WINDSOR AND ANNAPOLIS RAILWAY .- Thursday last being the first anniversary of the opening of the Windsor and Annapolis Railway, it was celebrated by a grand pic-nic at Waterville. The line has carried seventy thousand passengers during the year.

LARGE EGG.—Mr. Rufus Chapman has shown us one of his Black Spanish hen's eggs measuring 8 1-8 inches, longitudinally, and 6 inches, latitudinally, in circumference, and weighing nearly 34 ounces.—Am. Gazette.

SUICIDE.—A gentleman of the name of J. W. Finlay, was found drowned in the North West Arm last Saturday, and from letters in his trunk lef: at the Hotel where he had been staying it was discovered that the pressure of pecuniary difficulties acting on a mind weakened by broken health, had induced him to take the rash step which ended his life. The deceased was a Scotch gentleman of good education. A few years ago he had a sun stroke, which enfeeb ed his mental powers, and from which he never wholly recovered. He came here from Montreal about three weeks ago, and leaves a wife and family in that city. An inquest was he'd on the remains, and a verdict in accordance with the above facts recorded. The North British Society took charge of the funeral.
