REV. D. M. WELTON'S SERMON ON CHRISTIAN BAPTISM.

It is not likely that the controversy on Baptism will cease while so many perversions of the sacred ordinance exist, and impositions are practiced upon unconscious infants by loving christian parents. If parents would obey the Saviour's injunction, "Suffer little children to come unto me, and forbid them not," instead of administering to them a rite which is without Scripture authority, they would not embarrass them in future life, when brought to a knowledge of what is required of them on making a personal profession of faith in Christ and entering the christian church.

In the "Rev. D. M. Welton's Sermon in reply to Rev. Dr. Richey's two sermons," just published, we have a concise, and yet comprehensive view of the whole subject. Mr. W. has shown himself fully competent to deal with the question and to present it in a very acceptable and readable form. We commend this pamphlet of 77 pages to our Methodist and Presbyterian friends, as well adapted to show them what views Baptists hold, and why they differ with them on this christian duty.

Will you or one of your able correspondents answer the following question.

Suppose that a member of the church has been guilty of gross immorality, but when his crime is brought to the notice of the Church, the Pastor is absent, and the church neglects to act in the matter until his return, then at the first meeting of the church, the erring brother comes and makes a full acknowledgement of his guilt and begs the forgiveness of the Church: Should such a one be retained or excluded? ENQUIRER.

The exercise of discipline in a christian church is essential to its purity and life. It should, however, be observed according to scripture rule, or it fails to accomplish its most important aims and objects.

The above question is a very plain one, and very well put; so that we see no great difficulty in answering it. We do not perceive that any purpose would be served by the exclusion of an offending member who had become truly penitent. If the church has reason to believe that the transgressor is sincere in his sorrow for the sin he has committed, and shows by his consistent conduct that he desires to repair the injury he has done to the church, they should, we think, receive his acknowledgment of guilt as a guarantee of proper conduct in the future. The object of discipline is restoration: "If a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual restore such an one in the spirit of meekness; considering thyself lest thou also be tempted."
