LATEST FROM EUROPE.

LATEST WAR NEWS.

At length there appears some ground to hope for a cessation of wars barbarities and horrors in France. Negotiations have been opened for an armistice to commence on Friday inst., the 4th inst., and to continue till the 28th inst., for the purpose of enabling the elections to be held, and a Constituent Assembly to be called together which shall be recognized by the people, and with whom the Prussian Government may treat on the great matter of a continuance of war, or the terms on which peace may be secured. The assembly to meet on the 15th inst.

A telegram dated the 4th inst., says "The elections in Paris, on the question of maintaining the powers of the national defence committee, resulted in an overwhelming majority in favor of the government. The National Guard marched in battalions to the polls and deposited their votes. They were all 'yos'." On Saturday another telegram says: The elections in Paris on the question of maintaining the power of the Government of national defence, has resulted in an overwhelming majority in favor of the Government. The returns of the city are nearly complete, with the exception of three arrondissements.

In round numbers, the vote stands—ayes 442,000; nays 49,000—a majority of 393,000.

The correspondence between Earl Granville and Prussia is published. In it he deprecates the continuance of the war and calls attention to the present state of affairs, and the misery it has entailed. Admits the revictualling of Paris to be authorized by war usages, and urges an armistice enabling the Convention of a Constituent Assembly and the establishment of peace, and believes that representations to France would not be without effect.

The full text of the conditions had not transpired, but it was reported that the military status was to remain unchanged, and that Paris may receive provisions during the interval.

The announcement in Paris of the fall of Metz, and the proposition for an armistice, furnished the "Reds" with an occasion for a demonstration, which they made quite formidable and for several hours held the Hotel de Ville, with many members of the Committee of Safety as prisoners. The mob was at length dispersed by the soldiers.

The Reds have also made a riot in Marseilles, and attempted the assassination of a new Governor of the city.

The attempt at rioting in Paris was suppressed, and according to latest despatches perfect tranquillity existed in the city.

The National Guards in immense numbers, had felicitated Trochu on his escape from the rioters and the personal bravery he exhibited at that trying time. The general made a short speech, in reply, in which he said the republic alone can save us. If it is lost we shall all be lost.

King William has issued a congratulatory Address to his Army.

The "Independence Belge" says: "We have daily received visits from escaped officers of Bazaine's army. Their testimony is conclusive as to the treachery of their Commander."

The capitulation of Metz has placed a large number of Prussian troops at liberty. Of these it is said that seventy thousand are half way to Paris, and fifty thousand more are marching on Garibaldi at Besancon. Garibaldi has 25,000 men in his command.

The Empress Eugenie has visited Napoleon. She arrived at Wilhelmshohe incognito, on Sunday morning, and in the afternoon she visited the Emperor in company with Bazaine. Subsequently she went to Hanover.

The exciting news of the past few weeks will probably now have a slight suspension; and let us hope that wisdom will be given to the people and their rulers so that the terrible havoc and inhuman butcheries may be stopped.

Since the above was in type a telegram of Monday informs us that the negotiations for an armistice have been broken off. M. Thiers received orders to leave the conference.

The cause of the rupture is believed to be the

persistence of Bismarck in insisting on guarantees for the cession of territory. The Paris Government, will not assent to the conditions required by Bismarck.

The London Times of Monday last says the armistice turned on the question of free ingress and egress at Paris during the twenty-five days, Thiers insisting and Bismarck refusing. During the conference between Thiers and Favre at Sevres the Paris forts maintained a steady fire on the place of interview. The conference lasted over eight hours.

The general feeling is spreading all over France in favor of calling the Duke d'Aunale to the Presidency of the Republic.

The war goes on. The Prussian Ambassador at London says that the struggle will continue all winter.

Rochefort has resigned his position on the Committee of Defence, in consequence of a misunderstanding with the government on the question of Communal Elections. He has not been seen since.

ENGLAND.—The Tyne boat crew on their arrival in England published a card expressing their willingness to row the St. John crew again for £500 or more.

The Cabinet Council on Thursday last, resolved to grant the pardon of O' Donovan Rossa and other Fenian prisoners.

The negotiations between the North and South German States looking to a German Union are progressing.

SPAIN.—Madrid, Nov. 3.—One hundred and eighty of the three hundred Deputies in the Cortes are in favor of the Duke of Aosta's election to the Spanish Throne.

There are rumors here that disturbance had occurred and fighting taken place on the frontier near Perpignan.

Late Madrid despatches state that the discussion of the question of the future monarchy has been fixed for the 16th of November.

The prisoner was acquitted.

The Ontario Legislature will be called together for the transaction of business, on Wednesday, December 7th. The intention is to get through the usual preliminary work before Christmas, then adjourn over the holidays, and meet again early in January.

AQUATIC.—It is proposed by the Halifax Yacht Club to have a two or three days Regatta next summer—one part to be a four-oared gig race for a prize of from \$3000 to \$4000, and if possible to obtain the Tyne Crew, the St. John Paris Crew and the Ward Brothers, also a crew of Halifax men to take part in the contest.

DALHOUSIE COLLEGE.—The winter session of this Institution was opened on Tuesday of last week. Principal Ross in his opening address referred to the great want of a High School in Halifax, to which Mr. Rand so ably called attention at the previous gathering on behalf of this College.

Professor McDonald read the opening address the object of which was to set forth the advantages of having one university for the province, and changing the character of all the existing Colleges.

ARREST OF AN ALLEGED FORGER.—A telegram was received on Friday morning by the American Consul, stating that a man named Louis B. M. Dolby, had committed several forgeries in Philadelphia, and it was supposed had taken passage in the mail steamer Etna, for Halifax and Liverpool. The telegram was placed in the hands of police Sergeant Hutt, who found the man on the steamer and arrested him. Dolby will be detained until the arrival of an officer from the United States with the papers necessary for the extradition of the accused.—Colonist.

SUDDEN DEATH AT AMHERST.—Mr. James Fergusson, for many years a teacher at Amherst, died suddenly on Saturday week, from (said the Coroner's jury) "an overdose of laudanum, taken to produce sleep and ease pain."

A GOLD HAUL.—We understand that a school of Black Fish numbering one hundred and forty three were captured at Port Mouton on Thursday last; and that the company, owning them, are industriously engaged in manufacturing the oil from them. The company consists of fifty-six shares. It is to be hoped that this catch will prove very remunerative. A second school of Black Fish was seen but the parties failed in driving them on shore.—Liverpool Advertiser.

YARMOUTH GOLD.—An ingot of gold weighing 43 ounces, 16 dwts, 5 grains, and valued at upwards of 870 dollars, the product of the Yarmouth Mines, was on exhibition in the town of Yarmouth last week.

SHIPBUILDING IN YARMOUTH.—The Yarmouth Tribune is credibly informed that there are now contracted for, and will be built in the course of next year, on Yarmouth account, some eighteen vessels, aggregating 14,000 tons, and estimated to cost over half a million of dollars.

WINDSOR.—The Rev. A. R. Garvie has accepted a call to the Presbyterian Church in this place, and will be inducted to his charge on Tuesday, the 24th inst.

The Mail states that a man named Hurley in a row, last week, at Wentworth, struck one Peter Carrol with a spade, splitting his head open. Carrol lies in a very precarious state and has been delirious ever since. Hurley has not yet been arrested.
