**MR. JOHN GRANT, SENR.**

Mr. John Grant, Senr., of North Sydney, Cape Breton, departed this life on the 7th inst., aged 69 years. He was the father of the lamented William Grant, and has left a large circle of friends and connexions to mourn his death. He was converted to God under the labors of the Rev. John Hull, some forty-five years ago, but never made a public profession of his faith until the revival under the ministry of Bro. Shields in 1855. He was not so remarkable for his religious activity as for the clearness of his views. The atonement of Christ was the theme upon which he delighted to dwell both in sickness and health. Few who heard him, either in our social meetings, or upon his dying bed, will soon forget the force and beauty of his expressions respecting the way of salvation. His last utterance, after taking an affecting farewell of his children and friends, was "Lord now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace." The event was improved by a sermon from 2 Tim. 1: 12, last clause. May it be sanctified to the living, especially to those in whom he felt so deeply interested, and for whom in his last moments he expressed such confident hope.—*Com. by Rev. T. H. Porter.*

**Dominion and Foreign News.**

OTTAWA, June 28.—The terms of Union with British Columbia are not to be made known till they are submitted to the Government of that Colony.

30th.—The Premier leaves to-morrow for P. E. Island. Several ministers will leave the Capital for a few weeks. Hon. Mr. Tilley has already left for New Brunswick.

Hon. Mr. Tilley is spoken of as Lieutenant Gov. of British Columbia when admitted into the Union.

The latest Red River news is satisfactory. The new constitution is favorably received, and the Expedition is not opposed.

Immigrants continue arriving weekly, and find employment easy. Immigration is likely to be much larger this year than last.

The Manitoba expedition is not likely to make a start before the middle of July.

No stoppage occurred on the way to Shebanowan. All are in excellent health. General Lindsay is now there to inspect the forces.

Governor Archibald does not leave for some time.

TORONTO, June 29.—Seven deaths by sunstroke occurred through the Province within the last few days.

The Canadian Government grants to British Columbia seventy-five thousand dollars, her debt is assumed at two million dollars, but her actual debt is one million; therefore she receives interest in advance on one million.

July 2nd.—In Toronto the statue to the Canadians who were killed at Ridgway was unveiled by His Excellency the Governor General in presence of a vast concourse of people.

The North West will be formally transferred to the Dominion about the middle of the month.

The news from Manitobah is satisfactory.

It is believed that the American Government have made overtures for a new Reciprocity Treaty.

The Flour market is inactive, but holders are disposed to sell more largely at lower rates on account of the hot weather.

**The United States.**

NEW YORK, June 29.—A fire in Providence yesterday, destroyed the extensive coal sheds of Tucker, Swann & Co. Loss \$100,000.

Yesterday, lightning set fire to a twenty thousand barrel tank of oil at the oil wells, near Pittsburg, Penn., destroying all the property in the vicinity. Loss a half a million of dollars.

June 30th.—Indications are that the proposed treaty annexing San Domingo to United States will be defeated in Senate.

The Cubans are laying waste with fire all the estates of the Interior which can give shelter to the Spanish troops. Within two weeks thirty-four estates have been destroyed by fire.

The intense heat of the last few days has been accompanied by an increase of mortality of 75 per cent. The number of deaths the first four days of this week was 404, against 247 for the same period last week. There were eleven cases of sunstroke yesterday.

**LATEST FROM EUROPE.**

ENGLAND.—London, June 25.—The carpet weavers of England threaten to strike for higher wages.

There was an interesting scene at the wharf here on the occasion of the departure of the last Canadian emigrants for the season. The emigrants numbered 1200, and sailed in the ships Ganges and Piverol.

June 28.—The London papers reiterate the statement that Earl Granville, Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, will succeed the late Earl Clarendon as head of foreign office.

An American has offered to purchase the residence of the late Mr. Dickens, at Gads-hill, for twenty thousand pounds.

William Neall, Archdeacon of London, died yesterday, in the 75 year of his age.

June 25.—The opinion is expressed that an important Guarantee of European Peace has been lost in the death of Earl Clarendon.

Sir James Clark the distinguished Physician, is dead. He was 62 years of age.

July 1.—The tolls at five hundred turnpike gates in England, have been abolished under the Act passed last session of Parliament.

July 2.—A sharp shock of an earthquake was experienced throughout Greece yesterday. The town of Sartoria is a heap of ruins. An island in that neighborhood suddenly disappeared at the time of the shock.

A despatch from Rome says two-thirds of the fathers at the Ecumenical Council will go home as soon as the Infallibility dogma is promulgated.

The tide of American Immigration continues unabated. Eighteen thousand Emigrants left Liverpool in June for various American ports.

FRANCE.—Paris, June 25.—The Emperor has had another attack of rheumatism, brought on by a sudden change in the weather.

The Emperor Napoleon and Generals Prim and Serrano acquiesce in the abdication of Isabella on condition that no Prince of the house of Orleans should succeed to the throne of Spain.

**General Intelligence.**

**Province of Nova Scotia.**

THE "CITY OF BOSTON" DEFENCE FUND.—Rumors and statements respecting the overloading and general unseaworthiness of this ill-fated vessel have been floating about in this community from the time the first fears were entertained of her safety. A letter written by a young man of this city to his brother in England, was published in the Times, and has given rise to the issue of a writ of libel on the part of the Inman Company against the writer. In the sad calamity of the loss of the vessel the public generally are deeply involved, and it is necessary for the satisfaction of all parties, that a full, and as far as may be, impartial investigation should be made. With this view, a "Defence Fund" to meet the necessary expenses in conducting the case has been started in this city, and W. S. Stirling Esq., of the Union Bank has consented to receive contributions.

CONVENTION.—The fifteenth annual Young Men's Christian Association Convention was held this year at Indianapolis, on Thursday June 23, 1870, and entered upon its work under the most favorable auspices. There were present nearly five hundred delegates, representing about three hundred associations, from all parts of the United States and Canada—Christians of all denominations who came together to consult as to the best means of advancing the good cause. Before proceeding to business, the convention resolved to adopt a motto expressive of their dependence on God's Holy Spirit, and took the following: "Not by might nor by power, but my Spirit, with the Lord," which was unanimously adopted as the motto of the Convention.

The Executive Committee's Report shows the Association at large to be in a flourishing condition. The number of associations on the continent is 802 of which 207 were organized during the current year.

The Committee reports that there has been a steady growth in the associations in all that goes to make up real power for effective service. In New Brunswick there are now eleven associations, against three of last year; while in Nova Scotia there has been an increase of twenty-six.

THE SYNOD OF THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND IN THE MARITIME PROVINCES, has been meeting in St. Matthew's church during the past few days, and on Sunday the pulpits of most of the churches in this city were ably supplied by ministers who were here from various parts of the country.

REV. R. F. UNIACKE.—We have received a copy of a pamphlet which has been published by request, containing a sermon by the Rev. G. W. Hill on the occasion of the death of the Rev. R. F. Uniacke, the beloved Rector of St. George's Halifax, together with a sketch of his life. It forms a graceful tribute of respect and love, which will be much prized by the numerous friends and admirers of the lamented Pastor who was so generally known and beloved by all classes and denominations in this community.
