A BAR OF GOLD weighing 715 ounces was on exhibition at the Bank of Montreal last week. It was said to be worth \$14,000 principally from the Montague Mines.

COAL MINE MACHINERY.—The bark Alsie Craig, from Glasgow, with a locomotive and railroad iron for the Victoria Coal Mines at Cape Breton, arrived at Sydney on Wednesday last.

A large addition has been recently made to the Victoria Mines property. It is now we are informed scarcely surpassed in value by any coal-mines on this side the Atlantic.

AMHERST.—Accident.—On Thursday evening of last week, Mr. M. D. Pride was thrown from his waggon, one of the bolts having come out of the front. Both bones of one leg were broken. Mr. Wilbur Dimock was in the waggon with Mr. Pride, but fortunately escaped by jumping out behind.

Poisoned.—On Wednesday a child two years old, son of Joseph Cove was nearly poisoned from eating capsules of the aconite plant. The child was attended by a physician, and is recovering.

Buildings, large and more handsome, are to be erected shortly, by C. J. Townshend and J. S. Hickman, Esqs., on the sites of those destroyed recently.

Swept Away.—The Gazette says:—Our Local Members inform us that they have had applications for funds to replace about forty-five bridges chiefly between Napan and Five Islands, which were carried away by the recent freshet. We learn that some thousands of dollars are required to repair the damages on public roads, although next year's road grant had previously been drawn on.

Thunder Storm.—During the storm on Monday afternoon a cow belonging to Mr Samuel Embree, Salem, was killed by lightning.

INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY.—The work on the Intercolonial Railway is now progressing favorably. The cars from New Brunswick will run into Amherst before the close of the year. The contracts between Amherst and Truro are also being pushed vigorously forward, over two thousand men being employed on that part of the line.—Rep.

POLITICAL MEETINGS IN COLCHESTER.—Political meetings are being held in Colchester County.—One at Great Village on Saturday last, was addressed by Mr. Chambers, M. P. P., Senator McLelan, and Dr. McRoberts, and the chairman Mr. S. J. Fulton. 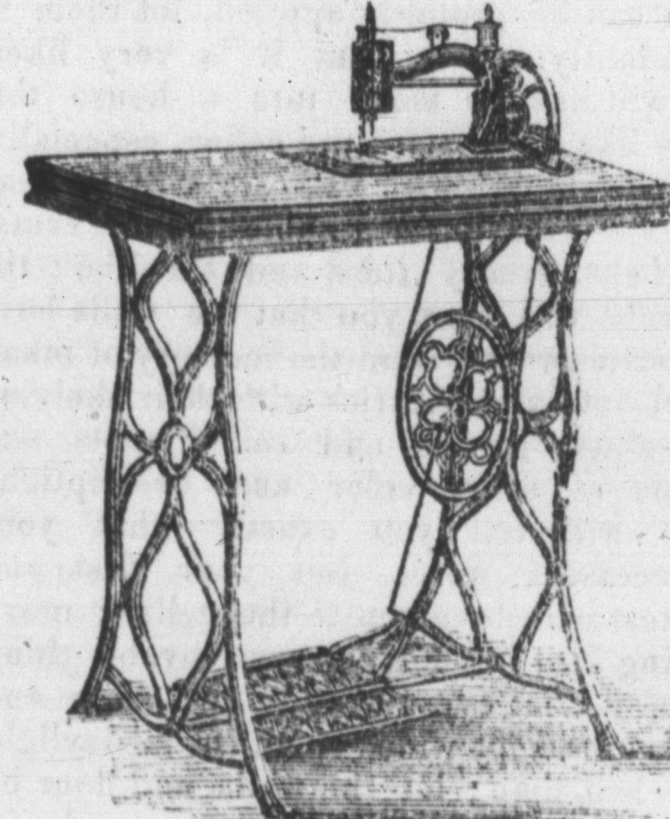

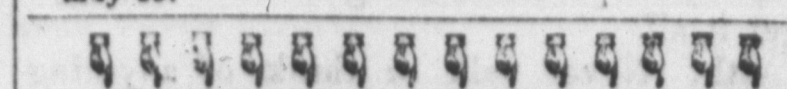
