General Intelligence.

Province of Nova Scotia.

NAVAL.—The flag ship Royal Alfred, with Admiral Wellesley on board, arrived here on Thursday morning. Other vessels of the fleet are daily expected to arrive from the West Indies.

A company has been formed to erect a "Halifax Concert Hall," Capital \$100,000, in 20,000 shares of \$5 each. Proposed site, between Variety Hall and the International Hotel.

THE ORATORIO OF ST. PAUL was finely rendered on Tuesday evening of last week, by the Philharmonic Society. The music of this composition is exceedingly difficult, and to be fully appreciated only by good musicians. The parts were well sustained, especially by the orchestra. The performing members of the Society, numbering about a hundred ladies and gentlemen, being amateurs, and engaged in various other avocations, showed, by the manner in which they took up the various parts, that, under their able leader, Mr. Doane, their musical studies have been of a high order and diligently pursued.

THE PROVINCIAL MUSEUM has of late received a number of additions to its valuable stock of treasures in Nature and Art. A visit to the large room of the New Provincial Building appropriated to this collection of specimens and curiosities, would well repay those who have not already seen them.

ACTION FOR LIBEL.—It is said that an action for libel has been commenced against some person in Halifax, who affirmed that the City of Boston was overloaded. Damages are laid at \$20,000.

THE QUEENS BIRTH-DAY.—A large number of persons came to Halifax by the Windsor and Annapolis Excursion train on Monday evening and witnessed the company of citizens in witnessing yesterday's military display on the Common.

CHALMERS CHURCH.—The Rev. Mr. Annand was inducted to the pastoral charge of the congregation worshipping in this place, on Friday last. The Rev. Mr. Falconer preached an able sermon on the occasion.

ADMINISTRATION OF OATHS.—At one o'clock on Monday last, in the Chamber of the Legislative Council, the Hon. Edward Kenny, Administrator of the Government of Nova Scotia, took the oaths of office in the presence of Hon. A. G. Archibald, Lieut. Governor of Manitoba, His Honor Chief Justice Young, Hon. Senator Miller, Hon. Messrs. A. Keith, M. I. Wilkins, Vall, Robertson, His Worship the Mayor and a number of other gentlemen. The Hon. Prov. Secretary read the Warrants of Office under the Great Seal, which were then endorsed by His Honor the Administrator. The Chief Justice then administered the usual oaths of office.

MAJOR GENERAL SIR HASTINGS DOYLE left Halifax on Friday afternoon, in the R. M. S. City of Cork. His visit to Great Britain is supposed to be for four months. There is some doubt however, whether he will return again. It is said that if he should obtain the expected promotion he will resign, and the Hon. Mr. Kenny will become the Lieutenant Governor, instead of Administrator for the time being.

The usual guard of honor and a large company of citizens attended at the wharf to take leave of His Excellency and gave very significant demonstrations of respect.

OPEN AIR PREACHING.—On Saturday afternoon last, Mr. James preached on the market wharf, and Mr. Owen on board a ship at Connor's wharf. Subsequently both held a similar service in City Street. There were very quiet, attentive audiences at each place. Here is a wide field of usefulness.

FIRE.—Halifax has had two or three destructive fires during the past week: one a building belonging to Mr. Thos. Bushell at King's Corner, another W. H. Thomas's Acadia Gardens, in Upper Water Street. The Hon. Attorney General boarded at the house, and it being in the middle of the night, his life was somewhat in danger.

KING'S COUNTY ELECTION, on Thursday last, resulted in the return of L. D. V. Chipman, Esq., without opposition, in place of his late father.

ICE.—During the past week there has been large quantities of ice in the Gulf, by which the steamer Prince of Wales has been much impeded in passing between Charlottetown and Pictou.

COAL-MINE ON FIRE.—The Foster pit at the Albion Mines took fire on Saturday last, and is still burning. The origin of the fire is not known.

DARTMOUTH.—A very melancholy case of suicide occurred at Dartmouth, on Friday last. Mr. Robert Moyes, boiler-maker, who has long resided there, and was much respected, had for some time past appeared more than usually dejected. He arose early in the morning went into an adjoining room and shot himself by placing the muzzle of the rifle under his chin. He immediately became unconscious and died about an hour after. On the table was found a dagger, and a paper in his hand writing, of which the following is a copy: "It is a debt that I owe of long standing, due to the world, that the prophecy be fulfilled, 'thy sins shall visit thee,' it is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God." An inquest was held on the same day and a verdict in accordance with the facts rendered, "temporary insanity."

NOEL.—We learn from the Windsor Mail of last week, that a very destructive fire occurred at Noel, on the previous Saturday, by which the Calceined Plaster Manufactory, owned by Messrs. Manning and Bros., was entirely destroyed. It is supposed to have originated from a spark on the roof.

YARMOUTH.—"Nineveh and its remains," was the subject of a lecture delivered by Dr Day, at Yarmouth last week.

The steamer LINDA met with an accident, by which her steam-engine became useless, off the Gale Reef, on Thursday, the 15th inst. she anchored off Meteghan, on Friday morning, and a messenger was sent to Yarmouth for a tug boat, by which she was taken to St. John, N. B., for repairs.

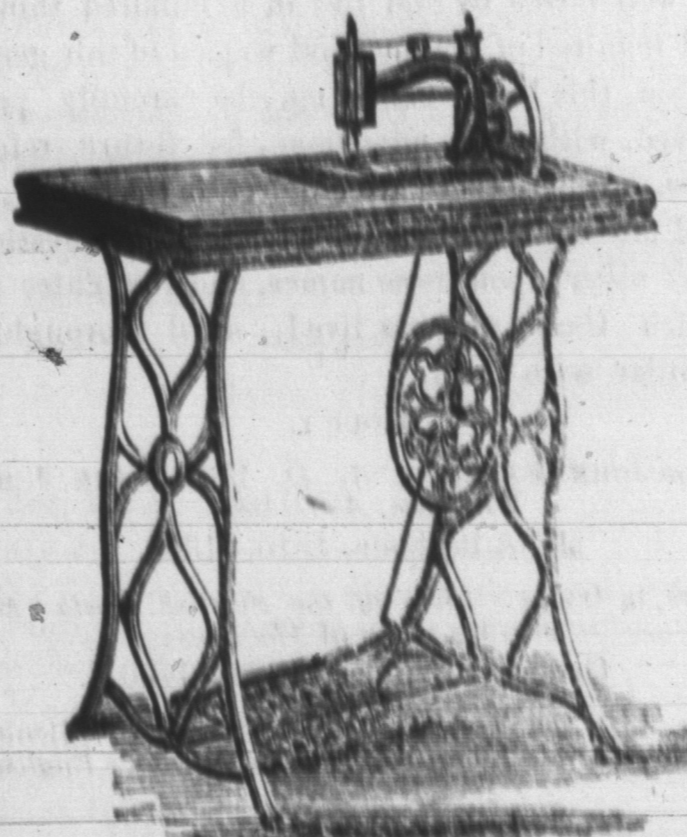
