bition, he has been thus suddenly struck down. His sad and unexpected death is a great blow to his numerous friends, particularly to his family, with whom we deeply sympathize. He was converted and baptized at Wolfville during his residence there, and remained to the moment of his untimely death a steadfast and consistent christian.

We would ask attention to the Advertizement, in another column, of Horton Collegiate Academy. It will be perceived that a change has been made in its management-it being now under direction of the N. S. Governors of Acadia College, who assume the responsibility of engaging the Teachers and directing the Academy generally. This is doubtless the proper position for the Institution to occupy, and will make it all that is required to supply the advanced course required for Students. A proper appreciation of the advantages afforded by the Academy would bring together a much larger number of students from the various parts of the Province. When the Common Schools of the country have more fully accomplished their work, there will doubtless be many more who will aim to give their sons additional educational advantages. We hope soon to know that Baptists are unwilling to be outstripped in the race, but with their efforts to provide higher education they will more largely avail themselves of its benefits.

Referring in our last issue to the Teachers' Annual Convention shortly to be held at Pictou, we expressed the hope that the Toachers would " not be deterred, by anything which has formerly occurred from fully discussing all matters relating to the work of education." A correspondent of the Morning Chronicle attempts to pervert this remark. Our reference was to the wellknown fact that notwithstanding the Association had, after a lengthy discussion, approved, by a very large majority, of the provisions of the law requiring the examination of all teachers on a uniform plan, the Education Department had entirely disregarded such an expression of opinion, by inviting certain persons to receive licenses without submitting to the prescribed Examination. We also had in mind the memorable fact that when the Teacher's Association sought to express its views by petition to the Legislature last winter, their petition was put " under the table," and threatening language was used towards them for daring to exercise a right which is inalienable to British subjects. We still hope 99 that although their expressions of opinion have been wholly disregarded, the Teachers will, nevertheless, in a calm and proper manner, continue to pass under review the educational policy and acts of the country.
