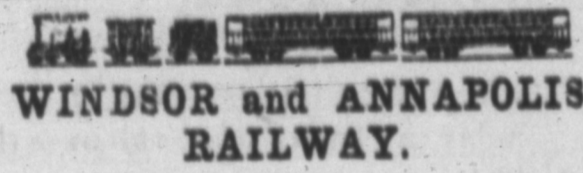

ON the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Customs, and under the authority given by the Act of the Parliament of Canada, 1 Vic., Cap. 6, intitled "An Act respecting the Customs," the provisions of which have by order in Council of this day been declared to be applicable to the Province of Manitoba. His Excellency has been pleased to Order; And it is hereby Ordered that the Town of Winnipeg in the said Province shall be and the same is hereby constituted and appointed a Port of Entry and a Warehousing Port, and that North Pembina shall be and the same is hereby constituted and appointed an out Port of Customs and placed under the survey of the Port Winnipeg.

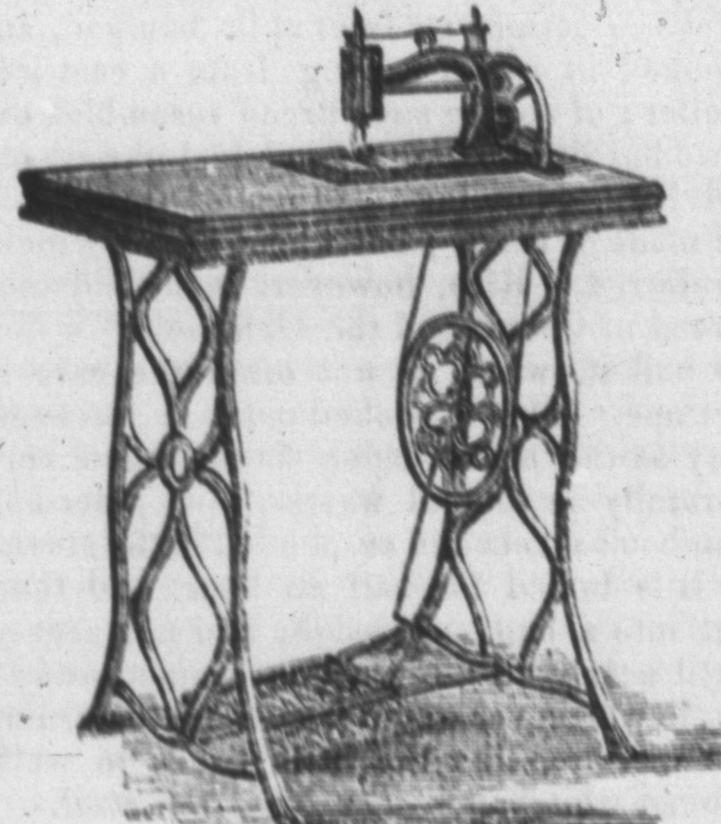
