

March 25.—The belief prevails in Liverpool that the City of Boston was sunk, in consequence of collision with an ice berg.

In the House of Commons on the 25th, the Bill for the Preservation of Peace in Ireland was amended by providing that each journal shall have one hearing before the edition can be forfeited, and authorizing public compensation to the families of the victims of agrarian murders.

General Lindsay has gone to Canada to organize the Militia.

Sir Clinton Murdoch, has gone to New York for the purpose of maturing extensive arrangements for the landing of immigrants.

Immigration to the United States from Ireland has opened this year with great vigor.

March 26.—The Irish Land Bill passed the House of Commons last night.

March 28.—The Convention of the Irish Church in session at Dublin has voted to invest a portion of its funds in American securities.

A great fire in the town of Comptah, India destroyed 200 houses and 2500 bales of cotton. Loss over 2,000,000 dollars.

FRANCE.—The Pope has refused the demand of Count Duree, that a representative of France should be admitted to the Council.

The trial of Prince Bonaparte for shooting Victor Noir, is progressing at Tours, and causing much excitement. It is said that the abuse indulged in by the prosecution has drawn the sympathy of the spectators somewhat towards the criminal.

The Emperor Napoleon has written an important letter to his Prime Minister in which he says:—"It would be expedient in the present condition of affairs to adopt all reforms which will restore constitutional government to France, in order to put an end to all that immoderate change which possesses certain spirits, who disturb the public mind by their belief in the instability of the present Regime."

March 28.—Prince Pierre Bonaparte has been acquitted. In spite of the strong appeals by the Procureur General for a verdict of "Guilty," with extenuating circumstances. The jury was out one hour. The Prince was immediately served with a civil process for one hundred thousand francs damages and was retained in custody. The news of his acquittal produced everywhere in France immense sensation and astonishment and is the universal topic of conversation.

SWITZERLAND is petitioning against the infallibility of the Pope.

SPAIN.—There is another crisis in Spain. Admiral Topete has resigned his seat in the Cabinet, which has been accepted and it is expected that Serrano will resign the Regency.

RUSSIA.—Cholera has re-appeared at St. Petersburg.

The Anti-Military agitation is extending to the States of South Germany and the subject is engaging the serious attention of these Governments.

ITALY.—The Ecumenical Council has been surprised and excited by the introduction of a motion, making the unanimous assent of the Bishops necessary to affirm the dogma of infallibility.

Magenta or Roseine, Magdala Pink, Crimson, Scarlet, Purple, Blue, Violet, light and deep Yellow, Green, Brown, and Ponceau Scarlet. Green requires pure wool in order to succeed, but cotton-annel won't take it. Most of them dissolve freely in hot water, others have to be first dissolved in a little spirits, and then added to the boiling water. Directions go with each packet. They are very easily used, all required is to dissolve the dye in boiling water, and put in the goods. Iron vessels should not be used, a milk dish well heated previous to the operation is the best. Some of these dyes make good Inks via Purple, Violet, Blue & Ponceau makes fine Jelly or Syrup coloring, of Red Ink.
