LIVERPOOL.—On Sunday night, the 4th inst., the three young men, Owen, Hackett and Anderson, who assaulted the Sheriff of Queen's County a few weeks ago, escaped from the jail at Liverpool and are still at large. It is believed that they took passage in a vessel bound to the United States.

NARROW ESCAPE.—On Saturday afternoon a drunken man fell between the platform and the train at Bedford Station and narrowly escaped death. Since the platforms on the Government railway were cut to allow the passage of the large cars of the Annapolis line the greatest care is necessary even by sober people in getting on and off the train, and drunken men would do better not to make the attempt at all.—Chron.

STRUCK OIL.—A gentleman interested in the Lake Ainslie Oil Company received a telegram on Saturday announcing that an oil well had been struck at 560 feet.

HALIFAX COUNTY.—The Court of Quarter Sessions met on Tuesday of last week, and the Grand Jury were addressed by his Honor the Custos, who announced that over five thousand children were receiving education in the Public Schools of the city, at a cost of about ten dollars each annually. In the County outside the city, there were nearly six thousand attending the schools, at an annual expense of about four dollars each. The difference in cost is accounted for by the fact that more expensive school-houses are required in the city. His Honor directed the attention of the Jury to the increase of pauper lunatics in the Asylum, which caused a largely increased tax, and suggested the propriety of adopting some means of reducing this expense.

DARTMOUTH.—The stable of Mr. J. P. Mott, Dartmouth, was forcibly entered on Friday night, and some harness stolen.

ACCIDENT.—On Thursday, a young man named John Barry, a carpenter, fell from a staging on a building near the Provincial and City Hospital and was severely injured.

Corporal Stowe indicted for trial in the Supreme Court upon a charge of having caused the death of a soldier some time since, by directing that he be gagged in the guard room, has been acquitted.

At a recent sitting of the City Council, Alderman Montgomery gave notice of his intention to resign his seat at the Board.

AMHERST.—Mr. John Bent of Salem, Cumberland County, while working over the flume in his saw-mill on Wednesday, fell to the bottom of it, a distance of 14 feet, striking across two pieces of timber. Although severely injured, hopes for his recovery are entertained.—Gazette.

The Lieutenant Governor of Ontario opened the Provincial Parliament on Wednesday last.

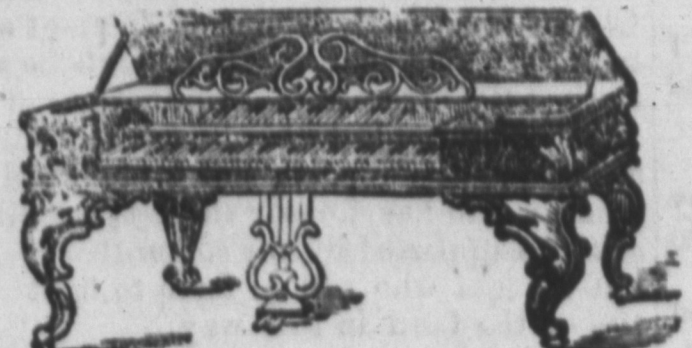
GOVERNMENT HOUSE, OTTAWA, 16th day of October, 1870.
