LATEST FROM EUROPE.

WAR NEWS.

Strasbourg was said to have capitulated on Wednesday last. Four hundred and fifty-one officers and 17,000 men laid down their arms. This was denied by the French papers.

Jules Favre report of his mission to the Prussian head quarters and conference with Bismark, does not indicate any speedy termination of hostilities. Thir views are entirely irreconcilable.

The Prussians appear to be concentrating their forces around Paris.

News from the seat of war is that Clermont has been captured. Soissans is invested, and at Mezieres an armistice has been declared.

A false report was raised last week, that the French had attacked the Prussian lines, beaten them and taken 5000 prisoners. This was sub-sequently pronounced false.

The following is the despatch of Saturday

Advices by balloon from Paris are up to 2, p.m. yesterday. All was quiet and the city defended by over half a million men. There is neither butter nor frult to be had anywhere in the city, and fresh meat will soon be scarce. There is, however, no lack of salted provisions and of flour there is a supply for six months.

It is thought that the Prussians are preparing for a grand attack on Paris from the north. King William yesterday forwarded the following from his head quarters, at Frereres:

Early this morning the French made a sortie against the troops of the 5th Prussians corps. while the 6th corps was attacked by three battallions; at the same time a brigade made a demonstration against the corps. At the end of two hours the French took shelter under the guns of the fort.

The Crown Prince commanded the Prussians. The Prussians took five hundred prisioners in front of Paris in an action on Saturday.

ENGLAND. -It is said that public sympathy is growing in favor of France.

On the 27th ult., a deputation of workingmen waited upon Mr. Gladstone and urged him to mediate between Germany and France.

Queen Victoria, yielding to public sentiment, has written a letter of condolence to the Empress

There has been a great flow of Specie to the Bank of England last week. The amount was 58,000 pounds sterling, greater than last Thursday evening.

I'he new iron-clad "Triumph" was launched at Yarrow on the 28th.

The British War office issued an order for the immediate formation of first reserve of the army. The authorities of the War Office are in con-

sultation with the board of works over the plans for complete fort fi ation of London. Russia is assuming a somewhat war like atti-

tude on a pretty, large scale; not now against Torkey but looking towards Prussia. The Russian Minister at Berlin has been in-

structed to present a formal demand to Prussia, declaring it to be quite impossible that Russia can regard it as a question solely to be decided between Germany and France, what the limits of either power shall be.

The Prussian corvette "Bertha" was sunk in the Euxine Sea, after a protracted engagement with three French Friga es.

A despatch received in London on the 1st, from Bombay, mentions the death of Lord Mayo, Viceroy of India.

SPAIN .- Madrid, Oct. 1 .- The vavages of Vomito are increasing on the Mediterranean coast; upwards of 120,000 persons have left

ITALY .- Rome .- A despatch on the 27th said the city is quiet, and confidence is returning in business circles. The Pope and the Cardinals

now show themselves in public again. The Pope will probably leave Rome as soon as the results of the plebiscitum is de lared which is thought will be unanimous. The Italian Parliament meets on the 12th proximo to ratify it. On the 18th the king will make a public entry into the city and alight at the Quirinal,

Oct 2.—The Pope declines to quit Rome, and will remain at the Castle of St. Angelo with an Italian Guard. His health is excellent.
