Mr. George, for the Burman field, and will hope for him a course as successful as that of Mr. Crawley, who we are glad to hear may be expected by us early in 1870, I trust the Board will not hesitate to send him at least overland—He is already in full panoply for his work, and we trust he will be hastened on.

You will be glad to learn, we have just closed the Fourth Annual Session of the Burmah Baptist Missionary Convention, and that we have had a profitable Session. I think the Convention is having a very happy effect in training the native christians to combined effort for the establishment and the propagation of Christianity in this Country.

Miss De Wolfe, did not attend the Convention so I have had no opportunity of delivering your message of remembrance. She is doing I am assured a good work in Persien.

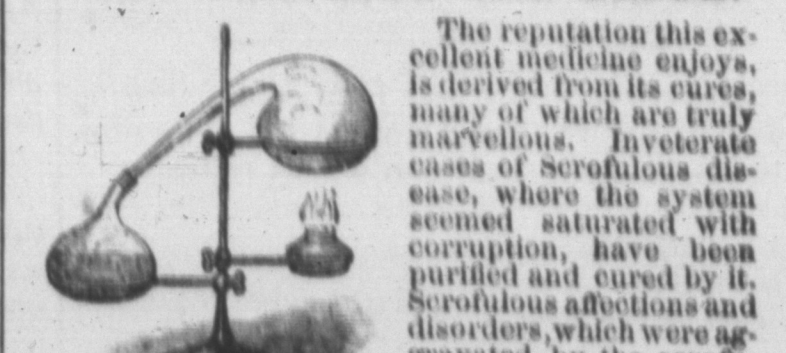
