

to, from the commencement of its erection, and all subsequent correspondence between the Local and Dominion governments in reference to it.

Mr. Lawrence moved that 8,000 copies of the correspondence be printed. This was objected to by Mr. Purdy and Mr. Hill as a waste of public money.

The motion to print 8000 copies passed.

WEDNESDAY, 8th Feb.

Mr. Landers presented a petition from inhabitants of Annapolis and its vicinity for money to build a bridge.

Mr. Purdy moved that 100 copies of the bill relative to Mines and Minerals be printed. Passed.

The bill relative to Justices of the Peace, the bill relative to County Assessments, the bill relative to Controverted Elections, and the bill relative to administration of Criminal Justice in the Supreme Court, passed a second reading and were referred to Committee.

Resolutions on Confederation.—Mr. Kidston asked the government to bring down the answer to the resolutions of last session on the subject of the political position of the Province.

Hon. Prov. Secretary said, that as soon as the correspondence could be got ready it would be laid on the table. He had expected to have been able to present it before.

Hon. Prov. Secretary, by command, laid on the table a petition from Sylvanus Morton and others, asking a return of moneys which they had paid for grants of Crown Lands. The Government felt that they could not comply with the request except by authority of a vote of the House.

Mr. Purdy gave notice of motion of a resolution requiring that all grants of more than 100 acres of land be withheld until 10th March next, when the House would arrive at a decision upon the Crown Land policy.

Mr. Kidston introduced a bill for the better regulation of elections.

Halifax Election.—The House then proceeded to the order of the day, the drawing of the committee to try the election of P. C. Hill, Esq.

The following names were drawn Messrs. D. McDonald, Townsend, Purdy, Eisenhaeur, Kirk, Atty. General, Morrison, Doucette, Hon. Mr. Flynn, Prov. Secretary, Hooper, Ross, Ryerson, Hon. Mr. Ferguson, Landers. The counsel for the sitting member and the petitioner then struck off those to whom they objected and the committee finally stood as follows:—Messrs. D. McDonald, Eisenhaeur, Attorney General, Morrison, Doucette, Hon. Mr. Flynn, Prov. Secretary.

THURSDAY, Feb. 9th.

The Hon. Attorney General stated that the Halifax Election Committee had met in the morning; and he asked the attention of the House to the fact that the Provincial Secretary was a member of that Committee, but that owing to the demands of his office upon his time it would be impossible for him to sit upon it.

Mr. Hill said the Provincial Secretary was present when the Committee was drawn and took the oath; and he (Mr. H.) thought it too late for him (the P. S.) to ask to be excused. If the House can grant leave to the Prov. Secretary it can do so to any other members of the Committee and thus the ground work of the tribunal for the trial of controverted elections will be cut away.

Dr. Murray and Mr. Desbrisay objected to the motion. After a lengthy debate the motion was put and carried by a vote of 27 to 5.

Hon. Prov. Secretary, by command, laid on the table a report of the survey of a line of Railway from New Glasgow to the Strait of Canso.

Mr. Hill's bill for the trial of Controverted Elections was next brought forward and discussed for a second reading, at some length. The motion was eventually withdrawn.

FRIDAY, Feb. 10th.

Mr. Desbrisay reported several bills from Committee.

Mr. Landers presented a bill providing for the re-building of a Bridge at Bridgetown.

Mr. Chambers presented a bill to amend Cap. 85 of Revised Statutes, relative to the weighing and inspection of Flour and Meal.

Mr. Kidston gave notice of motion providing for the printing of daily reports of the debates, for the use of members of the House.

Hon. Provincial Secretary thought it would be impossible to carry out such an arrangement.

Mr. Hill asked if it was the intention of the government to grant greater facilities of communication by roads and telegraph to Tangier and other places.

Hon. Provincial Secretary thought that the matter did not come within the province of government.

Mr. Hill wished simply to enquire whether the Government would be pre-

pared on public grounds to assist efforts in that direction.

The House committee on bills passed the following: To incorporate the Lawrence Manufacturing Company.

To amend Cap. 5 of the Act of 1870 relating to Justices of the Peace. The principal object of this is to provide for furnishing commissions to magistrates who may have lost or mislaid the original document.

The Bill respecting controverted elections introduced by the Attorney General, providing that a scrutiny committee may be struck in the House when there are twenty-four members present, instead of thirty-three as now required.

The Provincial Secretary laid upon the table return of all Crown Lands granted in 1870, and also a statement of all lands applied for and not granted, asked for by Mr. Desbrisay: of all blocks of over five hundred acres granted during the past fifteen years, asked for by Mr. Smith,

A despatch from Earl Kimberley, Secretary of State for the Colonies, respecting naturalization. The despatch contains the principal provisions of the agreement recently entered into on the subject between Great Britain and the United States.

An Application from the Examiners of the Normal School for additional remuneration, was referred to a committee consisting of Messrs. Smith, Wyld, White, Townsend and Landers.

Also the report of the Superintendent of Education. In introducing the report the Provincial Secretary said the expenditure for the year covered by the document had been \$176,561.

MONDAY, Feb. 13th.

The House met at 3 o'clock, and sat with closed doors until 4.

The bills passed in Committee of the whole on Friday were read a third time, and sent to the Legislative Council.

Mr. Pines presented several petitions for aid to roads in Cumberland.

Mr. Hill asked the Government to lay on the table a detailed statement of all contracts and expenditure upon the new Province Building, with the cost of maintaining the edifice from July 1st, 1867.

Mr. D. McDonald introduced a bill to amend the Act to incorporate the Eastern Railway Company.

The Attorney General introduced a bill to authorize the sale of a Meeting House at Onslow.

The Provincial Secretary laid on the table a copy of a despatch, respecting the qualification of Medical practitioners. A petition of Mr. Morris of the Crown Land Office for an increase of salary. Also copies of correspondence between the General and Local Government, respecting costs of criminal prosecutions. The Atty. General said he had prepared a short bill respecting this matter. He also read a letter from Sheriff Harding of St. John, N. B., respecting negotiations with the Dominion Government for the erection of a Penitentiary for the Maritime Provinces.
