Among them was the bill disqualifying Dominion officials from sitting in the Local Legislature, which was amended by making the time of resignation ten days before nomination day, or appointment to the Legislative Council, and providing that no Justice of the Peace or Queen's Council performing the ordinary duties of those offices shall be disqualified; and also the Crown Land Bill, which was amended by striking out the clause prohibiting the cutting of small trees. The bill to disfranchise Dominion officials was discussed and passed its second reading which, of course, settles its final passage by a vote of 11 to 9. The following was the vote: For the bill—Messrs. Brown, Almon, McNab, M. Heffey, Whitman, Tupper, Smyth, and Murrell, McKenna, and Dickie; against it—Messrs. Cutler, Pine, Creighton, McKinnon, Creelman, Heffernan, Parker, Frazer and Keith (President), G. Mr. Frazer was not present, having on that morning tendered his resignation, as he stated on the previous evening he intended doing. A bill to incorporate the Trustees of Chalmers Church, Halifax, was passed and sent to the Assembly, which was agreed to it. The bill to make the Crown Land Commissioner a departmental officer was carried, 11 to 8.
