General Garibaldi has been very ill, and his son Ricciotti was summoned to his bedside at Caprera, but at last accounts was recovering.

News of the Week.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—As Mr. John Lockheart of Parrsboro, was returning after a short drive near his own residence on the 3rd inst., his horse ran off, throwing him from his wagon, fracturing his skull and causing other injuries which resulted in death on Monday, the 7th inst.

SUDDEN DEATH.—Mr. and Mrs. Obed Smith were passengers per schr. Minna, which arrived on Friday afternoon last, from Boston. They walked up from the wharf, and just before reaching their own door, Mrs. S. exclaimed "Faint!" and dropped dead.

ACCOMMODATION.—A careful estimate shows that the various agencies which have been set to work, will be able to provide for as many as five thousand or more visitors, during the Aquatic Carnival next week, for all of whom abundant provision has been made, so that all may get not only lodgings, but plenty to eat.

HALIFAX MISSION CHURCH.—The Wesleyan publishes an account of a very interesting ceremony which took place on Monday, 7th inst., at the new Mission Church, now in process of erection on the Kemp Road.

SEVERE INJURY.—Mrs. Julia Kelley, of Shubenacadie, was severely injured on Monday the 14th inst., by falling down an embankment near the bridge at that place, while endeavoring to get clear of the Railway track just as the train was approaching.

THE KENTVILLE STAR says Henry Dennison of that town fell from a hay scaffold to a cart recently, and was severely injured.

SUFFOCATED.—A man named McGilvray, 24 years old, and only three weeks married, was killed by fire damp in the Ford Pit, Albion Mines, on Tuesday last.

NEW TUG.—Messrs. Lawson & Harrington have purchased an additional tug boat, named the "Goliath."

FINE STOCK.—Mr. Jonathan Rand of Cornwallis has a calf 4 1/2 months old which weighs 523 lbs.

MELANCHOLY EVENT.—At Labrador on the 2nd July John Handlon, of East Port Medway, aged 21 years; William Hartlon, of the Eastern Passage, Halifax, aged 24 years; and a Mr. Swan, of Barrington, were drowned by the upsetting of a boat in which they were sailing.

FROM ENGLAND.—The mail steamer Peruvian from Liverpool, via Queenstown, arrived here on Sunday evening at 6 o'clock, having made the passage in nine days from the former, and eight days from the latter port.

INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY.—The Eastern Chronicle says "That there are only twelve miles of rails to be laid in the gap in the European and North American Railway between Bangor and St. John. The work is progressing rapidly, and it is confidently expected that the road will be formally opened in October.
