

The Reporter's Special Dispatch of the 11th, says the Berlin Leader reports the following as the definitely arranged programme: "After the fall of Paris King William will return to Berlin. German troops will garrison the detached forts of Paris and other strong-holds. French troops will be left to control Paris itself, and the French nation will have full freedom to choose between reconstruction of the government or continuance of the war."

A battalion of Uhlans were defeated by French sharpshooters in an engagement which took place at Bouche near Alençon. Gambetta has compelled Prince de Joinville to leave France. The Gardes Mobiles of Brittany have given up in despair and disbanded. Two thousand Prussians attacked a force of 10,000 Mobiles on Friday at Courville. The French fought well, but were compelled to retire.

ENGLAND.—The position in reference to protecting the Pope taken by Mr. Gladstone has aroused a strong feeling of hostility to him in Great Britain. It was evidently an indiscretion for him to guarantee the defence of His Holiness, except from persecution, the same as any other refugee. An immense meeting was held on Tuesday the 10th at Greenwich, demanding Mr. Gladstone's resignation. There was great disturbance and some fighting.

Mr. William Munsell, the member for Limerick in the British Parliament, has offered the Pope a residence on his estate in Ireland.

Mr. Shaw Le Fevre has been appointed Secretary of State for the Home Department.

An explosion occurred in the Renshaw Colliery, Sheffield, on Thursday, by which twenty-six persons were killed and nine injured.

London, Jan. 13.—The steamer "Hansa" has arrived from New York, and reports the steamer "City of Brooklyn," previously reported lost propeller, proceeding under sail for Liverpool. The Inman steamer "City of Durham" has been sent to the assistance of the "City of Brooklyn." Tel. to Chronicle.

A balloon was seen passing over London on Tuesday last. It caused great excitement among the citizens, by many of whom it was watched for a long time. It is supposed to have come from Paris. Nothing has, however, been yet heard of its alighting.

On Change on Wednesday the French financial difficulties were reported to be frightful. There was, in consequence, great depression in the money market.

The conference on the Eastern question is summoned to meet next Tuesday.

The Nova Scotia barque "Crescent" was lost by coming in collision with the ship "Calliope" in the Mersey. Both vessels sunk.

The Belgian cabinet has earnestly sought to extract a programme for universal peace from the London Conference about to assemble.

The French Foreign Office has protested against the bombardment of Paris, on the ground that it was commenced without the formal notification required by the usages of civil warfare.

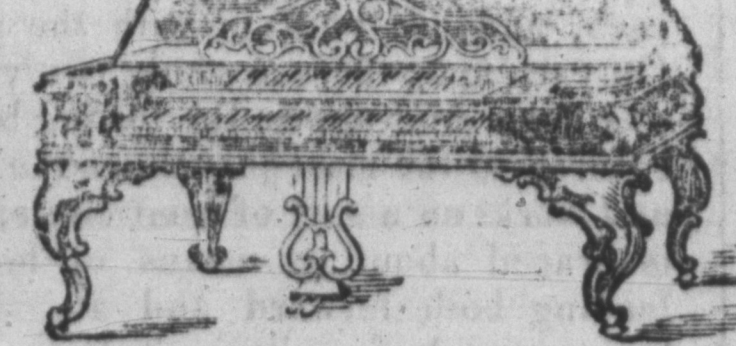
