All persons nominated as Revisors, under Chapter twenty-eight of the Acts of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, passed in the year 1863, intituled "An act to regulate the election of members to serve in the General Assembly," shall in the present year 1871, within three months after the passing of this ect, and in any future year all the time of their preparing the annual list of Electors qualified to vote at election of members of the General Assembly, prepare also, and file with the Clerk of the Peace a like alphabetical list of Electors qualified to vote at elections of Members to serve in the House of Commons of Canada, by adding to the list of Voters for Members of the General Assembly the names of officials and employees of the Dominion Government qualified to vote at elections of Members of the General Assembly under the laws in force in Nova Scotia on the first day of July, 1867, but who may have been disqualified by any Act of the Legislature of that Province passed after the same day.
