When a political newspaper is at a loss for an argument against Bible-school and Bible education, he gets up the cry of 'Sectarianism,' and reckons that he has silenced his opponent. When a public orator winds up his denunciation of any particular measure, he calls it 'illiberal,' so as to make any defence or approbation of it too hateful to be attempt. ed. When a pamphleteer would put down Protestant, zeal, he writes 'bigotry,' and causes it to be printed in large capitals. When a Romanist stigmatizes the circula tion of the Scriptures, he calls it 'proselytizing;' and when he objects to the circulation of tracts, he calls it persecution.
