GOOD STOCK.

In quoting the old but frue statement, "that one of the most important items of a good farm is its stock, and that it is just as cheap to keep a good cow, &c., as a poor one, and cheaper, because more profit is derived from the same keeping," we are reminded that many turn over their best calves, lambs, etc., to the butcher for a trifling extra price, which is exceedingly detrimental to the best interests of the farmer. Now, as the season approaches for farmers to pay attention to what class they select for use for breeding purposes, as it is neither profitable nor expedient for farmers to keep bad stock on the farm it is a fortunate circumstance for any neighbourhood or settlement to have pure bred stock available for breeding purposes, and the advantages to derive therefrom should be highly prized and made use of much more than is generally the case.

PLANTING POTATOES. - Potatoes should be planted in rather light loamy soil, well drained, and which has been well manured the previous year for some green crop, as, when planted with new laid-in manures in the furrows, the sets are often burned up and partly destroyed, causing blanks which otherwise would not be. Let the manure be well trenched in the autumn, and when whole sets are planted cut off a piece of potato at the lower end, as, if this be not done, the set is apt to retain the moisture that should go to the young tuber as nourishment. It is desirable that fresh seed should be obtained every year, as the liability to disease is increased if the last year's seed is planted on the same ground. Potatoes, especially for seed, should be grown on newly taken in land or moss land; such seed always yields the heaviest crops. Early kinds : hould be planted eighteen inches between the drills, and twelve inches from set to set; late potatoes require more room, -twenty inches between the drills and sixteen to eighteen inches from set to set. When the plant appears above the ground, carefully draw the earth about it with hoe or plough, and keep the ground clean till the haulms meet in the drills. If the flowers of the plants are picked off before they run into plums, the crop will be increased about a third more than if the plums were left to ripen, as much of the strength of the plant must go as nourishment to the seed.

> SAVING THE POTATOES .- A correspondent of the Rural New-Yorker "sprouts" his potatoes to the length of six or eight inches. He than pulls off the sprouts, and sets them out as he would cabbage plants. He finds his sprout-seed yield in this way as much as seed potatoes, and has the potatoes left to feed or eat.

SWEETENING A CASK .- A corres. pondent writing to the New York Farmers' Club says that he has known a very foul cask to be entirely cleansed by filling it with dry earth and leaving it four or five days. The earth treatment, followed by scalding lime-water, will sweeten anything but a very old and rancid tub.
