"News to the Senate of Rome concerning Jesus Christ in the days of Tiberius Caesar the Emperor, as the governors of sundry provinces under the Senate and people of Rome used to advertise the Senate of such news as chanced in diverse countries"

"Publius Lentulus, being at that time president in Judea, wrote an epistle to the Senate and people of Rome, the words whereof were these:— 'I have appeared in these our days a man of great virtue named Jesus Christ, who is yet alive amongst us and of the gentiles is accounted for a Prophet of God but his own disciples called him the son of God. He raised the dead and cured all manner of diseases. A man of stature somewhat tall and comely, with a very serene countenance and such as the beholders may both love and fear; his hair of the colour of pht herb full ripe and plain almost down to his ears; but from the ears downward somewhat curled, and more outward of colour, waving on his shoulders. In the midst of his head, both a sea, or partition of his hair after the manner of the Nazareites; his forehead, very plain and smooth; his face, without spot or wrinkle, beautified with a comely red; his nose and mouth so formed as nothing can be reprehended; his beard somewhat thick agreeable in colour to the hair of his head, not of any great length in the mid of an ion cent and mature look; his eyes, very clear and quick. Mail Contract.

SEALED TENDERS addressed to the Post Office Inspector, and marked SEALED TENDER FOR MAIL SERVICE, will be received at HALIFAX until 12 o'clock, noon, on FRIDAY, the 15th DECEMBER, for the conveyance of Her Majesty's Mails six times per week, each way, between New Glasgow and Sydney, including the two Branch Routes between Antigonish and Gushovort, and Tracadie and Port Mulgrave, on and from the first day of February next.

The conveyance to be made between New Glasgow and Sydney in a first class stage, and Branch Lines by horse and wagon.

The route proposed in conveyance of this Mail to be as above.

The computed distance between New Glasgow and Sydney is 150 miles; Antigonish and Gushovort 38 miles; Tracadie and Port Mulgrave, 16 miles.

The rate of travel to be not less than six miles per hour, including stoppages for all purposes.

The days and hours of Arrival and Departure to be as follows, subject to a right of the Postmaster General to alter the same, should he consider it advisable so to do.

Leave New Glasgow daily, after arrival of Mail Train from Halifax. Arrive at Sydney in thirty-eight hours. Leave Sydney daily at 4 p.m. Arrive at New Glasgow in time to connect with Mail Train from P. I. to.

Leave Antigonish daily after arrival of Mail from New Glasgow. Arrive at Gushovort in seven hours. Leave Gushovort daily at 10 a.m. Arrive at Antigonish in seven hours. Leave Tracadie daily after arrival of Mail from Antigonish. Arrive at Port Mulgrave in three hours. Leave Port Mulgrave daily at 11 a.m. Arrive at Tracadie in three hours.

The Contract, if satisfactorily executed, will continue in force for a term not exceeding four years, the Postmaster General reserving the right to terminate the agreement at any time previous to the expiration of the four years—should the public interest, in his opinion, require it—upon giving the Contractor or three months previous notice of his intention.
