ASYLUM FOR THE INSANE. - We have received a copy of the Annual Report of this institution. We learn from it that the admissions in 1870 were 70 of whom 43 were males and 27 females. The entire number of patients during the year was 315. During 1870 fifty five were discharged, leaving 260 on the record at the close of the year. The average daily number for the year was 261, and the recoveries twenty-four, being at the rate of thirty-four and a fourth per eent on admissions. Twenty-five patients died, making the mortality rate for the year nine and a half per cent, when reckoned on the whole number under care. 695 have been admitted in all, of whom 435 have been discharged. The increase in the number of patients still continues from year to year, notwithstanding that many hopeless cases have been unavoidably refused admission. During the past six years the numbers remaining on the 31st December have been as follows: 150, 157, 169, 216, 246, and 260. There are now in the Asylum ten patients beyond the number that ought to be under care at one time with the limi ted accommodation. Owing to the overcrowded condition of the Hospital the general health of the inmates was somewhat below the average of former years.


