DeBlois, the theme of his paper was 'Restricted Communion.' News of the Week.

A young man named George Shaffer was accidentally drowned, while bathing in the Shubenacadie river on Tuesday of last week. He was a resident of this city, a carpenter by trade, employed in the railway works. He leaves a wife and one child.

An illicit Still was seized on Gottingen Street on the 27th ult., by the officers of the Inland Revenue Department.

A colored lad was seriously injured by a bull he was driving on Wednesday morning in the vicinity of the Common.

Our fish market has been plentifully supplied with mackerel during the past week, taken at Prospect and vicinity.

THE NEW CANADIAN CURRENCY is now in free circulation in the city. The imperial employees were, last week, paid their wages in this coin instead of the usual British silver. The Notes of one and two dollars will be a great convenience.

PERSONAL.—Hon. Alexander Campbell, Postmaster General; Hon. Peter Mitchell, Minister of Marine; Hon. Dr. Tupper, President of the Privy Council; Hon. Jas. Cuckburn, Speaker of the House of Commons, and Senator Ryan, of Montreal, arrived in town on Saturday night.—Chron.

SMOKERS BEWARE.—On Friday evening about 9 o'clock a fire broke out in a barn on Albermarle street, occupied by Mr. Huskins. It originated from a match used by a man in lighting his pipe, which ignited the hay, and in a minute the building was in flames. The barn in which the fire originated and an adjoining shed, with a large quantity of hay and oats, were destroyed.

THE MAN WHO SET FIRE TO THE SCHOOLHOUSE.—Donald Gillies, was brought to this city by Sheriff McDougall, Inverness, and placed in the Penitentiary on Thursday to serve out a term of four years, imposed on him by Judge DesBarres at Port Hood for burning a school house. When arraigned he pleaded "guilty." The School house burners had better take notice of this and cease their vandalism.

AQUATIC CARNIVAL FUND.—The Provincial Government has granted the sum of \$1000 towards the Aquatic Carnival Fund \$750 of which is to be devoted as prizes for fishing and coasting vessels; and \$250 to form a prize for the first Nova Scotian crew in the race open to the world.

The last of the Inman steamers from England and New York were here on Saturday last. The City of Halifax will continue for the Newfoundland service till February next. Our next mails will be by the Allen line.

KINGS COLLEGE.—The eighty third anniversary of the foundation of King's College, Windsor, took place on the 29th ult. The programme was strictly carried out.

At 10, a. m., the procession formed at the College and marched to the Parish Church, where his Lordship Bishop Binney and other clergymen officiated, and Rev. Mr. Owen preached the sermon.

At the close of those proceedings the procession reformed and returned to the College Hall, a building which may now be pronounced one of the handsomest of its style in America. The ceremony of conferring degrees and prizes was then proceeded with: John Lawson, M. A., of Charlottetown, received the degree of D. C. L. Messrs. E. Gilpin, J. L. Keating, C. S. Hamilton, and F. Peters received the degree of B. A., Mr. Dodwell received the Wellsford Prize, Mr. Keating, the prize for Mineralogy and Mr. Boyd that for Elocution.

The Aiken's historical prize was awarded to Rev. Mr. Smith, Wesleyan Minister, being for the best essay on the County of Shelburne.

Rev. Dr. McAuley, President, delivered an historical review of the progress of the College, in the past. Rev. Dr. Hensley, spoke upon the future of the Institution. A. M. Uniacke, Esq., showed how the country had progressed and how the Institutions of learning had kept pace with progress. His Lordship the Bishop, then closed then the performances with an elaborate, and highly beneficial address upon the question of University Education and kindred topics.—Reporter.

The Cape Breton News reports that the "International Coal and Railway Co." is at present shipping at the rate of seven hundred tons of coal daily at their Pier below Sydney.

The Rev. Mr. Burdett, an English Baptist Clergyman, has been in the upper part of this county on a visit to his son, who is located in that region. He has preached at Nictaux, Pine Grove, Lawrence town and Valley West. Persons, competent to judge, who have heard him, say his pulpit talents are of a high order.—Free Press.

The Bridgewater "Times" says that extensive lumbering operations will shortly be commenced on Gold River, by S. P. Benjamin & Co., which will give employment to hundreds of men and teams, besides giving an incentive to the raising of produce. A healthy business, infusing new life, and diffusing money in great abundance, will be the result of this enterprise.

LONDONBERRY.—On Wednesday evening last an elderly man named Charles Vance, was choked to death by a piece of meat while taking his supper. A doctor was summoned and reached the house within five minutes from the time Mr. Vance complained, but it was too late.

LAHAYE.—A new house at the mouth of the Lahaye river, owned by Mr. Rufus Oxner, was destroyed by fire on the 21st inst.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE, OTTAWA.

Thursday, 13th day of June, 1871. PRESENT: His Excellency the Governor General in Council.

On the recommendation of the Hon. the Minister of Customs, and for the reason given in his Report on the 8th June instant, His Excellency has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Red River, in the Province of Manitoba, from the point of its intersection with the Boundary Line between the United States and the said Province of Manitoba (Canada) to its junction with Lake Winnipeg shall be and the same is hereby declared to be comprised within the limits of the Port of Winnipeg under the following conditions and restrictions, that is to say,—

Any Coasters, Vessels and boats of any kind, on entering the said province of Manitoba, on the Red River, shall be, and they are hereby required to report at the Out Port of North Pembina, and to comply with all existing requirements of the Law, but, on payment of duty at that Out Port on goods destined for any place between that Out Port and the Port of Winnipeg, they are permitted, on the warrant of the Sub-Collector, to land and discharge such goods, or the luggage of such passengers as may desire to disembark, before reaching the said Port of Winnipeg.

That in like manner, after payment of duties at the Port of Winnipeg, the same privilege be granted them as at the said Out Port,—to land and discharge goods under the restrictions aforesaid at any place on the Red River above or below Winnipeg,—and all steamers plying within the limits, and observing the conditions aforesaid, shall be considered and treated as trading within the limits of the said Port of Winnipeg.
