

tures of France. They maintain that the question concerns France alone. The work of rejuvenating Paris is progressing. Fully sixty thousand mans are engaged in repairing damaged buildings and erecting new ones.

The city is being disinfected. Orders have been issued from German headquarters, forbidding the army of occupation from entering Paris. Elections in France are proceeding quietly. It is thought Gambetta is elected for Havre.

Rochefort is pronounced insane. Of the radicals Gambetta was alone successful. The "Siecle" states that the army did not vote.

SPAIN.—There is some trouble imminent in the Cabinet. A majority of the cortes, having voted against them, they have contemplated a resignation. Moret and Serrano intimated their intention of resigning office. By latest accounts Moret had decided to remain in the Cabinet, the Cortes having agreed to adopt the measure he proposed.

ITALY.—The delay shewn in the removal of the Government to Rome is made the ground of an opinion held by many that it will not take place. A movement of Victor Emmanuel on Friday last however indicates that it is his intention to make the Eternal City his capital. He had left Florence on that day and arrived at Naples, and would proceed thence to Rome.

The Pope in his reply to the address of sympathy from the Catholics, praises the zeal they exhibit in the cause of the church and of himself, and denounces "Liberal Catholicism," as an evil as formidable as a revolution or the Commune.

His Holiness fails to see or to admit that the revolution and the Commune are the product of Ultramontanism and the infidelity which is one of its results.—Nothing less than absolute submission to all the dogmas is to be borne. The scruples of the best men in the church are to have no more respect than the wildest wickedness of the Parisian profligates. This harmonizes well with her past history.

By latest telegrams we learn that the official Gazette of the Italian Government has been transferred to Rome, and the first number appeared on Saturday last.

Every preparation is being made to give Victor Emmanuel a royal welcome. Several Senators, and Mayors, and a large number of visitors have arrived.

PERKIA.—The following horrible statement is given of the results of the terrible famine prevailing in this country. At Yeed some five hundred children were killed and eaten by the starving population.

We can hardly believe that it is true, although such things have been in the past, and we may only hope to receive a contradiction of the report.

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC! POST CARDS.

UNDER the authority of the Post Office Act, 1867, Canada Post Cards bearing an impressed Stamp of one cent are now ready to be issued for sale to the public by the Department at one cent each, and such Post Cards will pass as Mailable matter throughout the Dominion without further charge for delivery from any Post or Way Office subject to the following conditions:—

- 1. The front or stamped side of the card is to be used for the address only, there must be nothing else either written or printed on it. 2. On the other or reverse side any communication whether of the nature of a letter or otherwise may be written or printed. Nothing whatever may be attached to the card, nor may it be folded, cut or otherwise altered. 3. There must be no words, marks, or designs, written, printed, or otherwise placed on the cards, of an obscene, indecent, immoral, libellous, or grossly offensive character. 4. No Post Card can be used as a seal and time. If a Post Card be posted, which infringes any of the above conditions it will be forwarded by first post under cover to the Post Master General. A Post Card may be registered under the same Regulations as a letter, if the Registration charge be prepared by fixing an ordinary two cent Postage Stamp. A. WOODGATE P. O. I. CHANGE OF CURRENCY.

THE Act to establish one uniform Currency for the Dominion of Canada, passed in the last Session of Parliament, provides: "That on and after July 1st, 1871, the value of the Dollar shall be such that Four Dollars and Eighty-six cents and two-thirds of a cent are equal to One Pound Sterling.

All money payable in Nova Scotia after July 1, 1871, under any law passed before that day, or under any bill, note, contract, or other agreement made before that day, and which, if the Act altering the Currency had not been passed, would have been payable in Nova Scotia Currency, will be payable in Canada Currency, at the rate of seventy-three cents for every seventy-five cents, which would have been payable in Nova Scotia Currency.

All notes of the Province of Nova Scotia or of any Bank in Nova Scotia, and all notes of the Province of Canada, made specially payable at Halifax, issued before July 1, 1871, are redeemable in the equivalent to Nova Scotia Currency, viz: 73 cts. of Canada Currency for every seventy-five cents of Nova Scotia Currency; but all notes of any Bank in Nova Scotia, or Dominion notes payable at Halifax issued after July 1, 1871, are redeemable in Canada Currency. All silver, copper, and bronze coins struck for circulation in Ontario, Quebec and New Brunswick will be current in Nova Scotia after July 1, 1871, at the rate assigned to them in Canada Currency, and the silver coins are a legal tender to the amount of Ten Dollars, and the copper and bronze coins to the amount of twenty-five cents.
