

Bill. Hon. Attorney General, Mr. Smith and Mr. White, were appointed a committee to confer with the Council. The result was that some slight alterations were made—the officials of the Public works and Crown Lands Department were included amongst those to be disfranchised—and the bill passed.

Speeches were made in reference to Railway surveys. Hon. Provincial Sec. said the portion of the Governor's speech having reference to this matter had not been fulfilled, but he hoped at a future day government would be able to make some appropriation for that object.

Dr. Murray characterized the action of government as unjust and tyrannical in not allowing him a voice in the disbursement of the Road monies for his county. Mr. Chambers also complained of similar treatment.

In the afternoon the Council reported their agreement to the Bill for Disfranchising Dominion officers; and shortly after, at 3 o'clock, His Excellency's summons was received for the House to attend in the Council Chamber.

The members accompanied the Hon. Speaker, when His Excellency gave his assent to all the bills passed during the present Session, and prorogued the Legislature, by the following speech:—

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

The prompt attention which you have given to the various matters that have been submitted for your consideration has brought the public business to such a state of forwardness that I am able, at this comparatively early period, to release you from further attendance upon your Legislative duties.

The Resolutions which you placed on the Journals of both Houses on the recent marriage of Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise, testify to the devotion, and the warm interest which Her Majesty's Colonial subjects feel in the fortunes of Her Royal House.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

I thank you for the supplies voted for the year, and you may depend upon their being faithfully expended.

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

That a joint High Commission has been appointed to deliberate upon the Fisheries and the Alabama Claims, and that Commission has entered upon its labors at Washington are facts which have been made public and have occurred since the beginning of your Session, and cannot but be a matter of deep concern to this Dominion, and especially to the Maritime Provinces. I trust that, in any arrangement which the Commissioners may agree jointly to recommend to their respective Governments, the peculiar interests of Nova Scotia, will not be overlooked.

The measures which you have perfected with a view to improve the Constitution and to give additional security to the independence of the Legislature will, we may hope, satisfactorily accomplish those objects.

I am glad that in compliance with the recommendation made in my speech at the opening of the Session, you have elaborated and matured a measure which you consider calculated to strengthen the hands of Government in dealing with the Crown Land question, and to arrest the spirit of speculation therein, which has lately been on the increase.

As the term allotted by Law for the duration of the existing Parliament is now drawing to a close, it is probable that this will be its last Session. Therefore in now taking leave of you, and permitting you to return to your homes, I earnestly impress upon you that your country has claims upon your time and services, as much in a private as in a public station; and let me also express the hope that, in either capacity, you will take a hearty interest in all that concerns the welfare, moral and material, of Nova Scotia—combining therewith a true and loyal regard for the institutions of the Mother Country, to which we all owe so much, and an unswerving attachment to the throne of England and the Sovereign who occupies it.

While other Countries are still suffering from the disastrous effects of the late war, and from the Revolutionary spirit which has been awakened by it, we remain in the enjoyment of peace, plenty, and security, for which we have every reason to be deeply grateful to Him in whose hands are the Destinies of all the Nations of the Earth.

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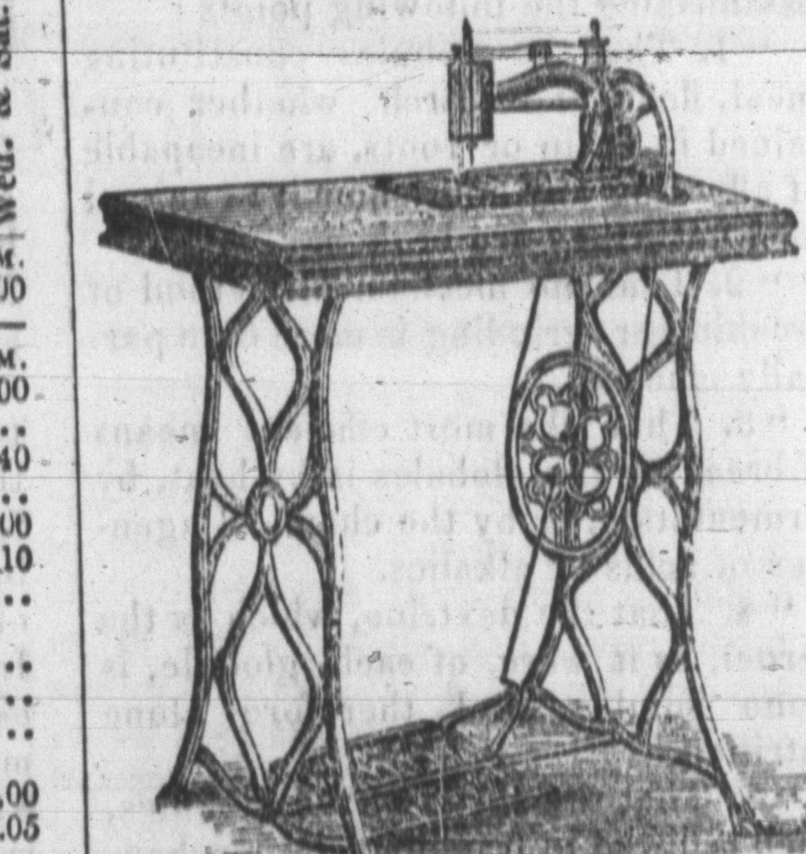
