The Procession was formed in front of the Province building, comprising the splendid band and pipers of the regiment, and as many of the officers and men as could be spared, together with the members of the North British and Highland Societies. They proceeded thence to Temperance Hall JOHN R. KEAN, Pastor of the Congregawith bands playing and banners flying Sir Wi liam Young was there to take the chair, and Hon. Mr. Garvie to give an oration. The afternoon and evening festivities, and perhaps frivolities, were we doubt not carried out according to the programme. And so Sir Walter's memory may now go on for another century. The next centenary will probably have a somewhat different celebration.

CITY DONATION TO THE ROWERS .- The City Council at its last meeting voted \$200 for the training fund of the Tangier crew and \$100 for that of the Roche crew. The money is to be taken from the contingent fund of the Council.

YARMOUTH SALT WORKS .- The Salt Works recently established in Yarmouth are reported to be prospering. The article is manufactured from West India salt, which is well known to be very much stronger than either that of Liverpool or Cadiz. After going through the several processes, the salt is put up in 5, 10, 15 and 20 lb. bags ; that for curing fish is ground to the ordinary shot, while that for diary purposes is reduced to powder.

THE CONTESTANTS FOR THE HALIFAX ROWING MATCHES .- It is said the American Crew are under vigorous training on the Harlem River. They row twice the distance of the Halifax course three times a day, besides walking and other exercise. The crew will probably leave 13th year of his age.
