News of the Week.

THE COLD was intense on Thursday night. It is said that the thermometer was 5 below zero during the night.

Four of the bodies of those unfortunately drowned in the Basin of Minas at the loss of the Achilles were discovered at the Bar near Kempton on Saturday and Sunday of last week. They were identified as the remains of Charles Webb, James Meekins, William Battie and John Giddis.

On Thursday night, while going along the street, near the new Post Office, Bernard Gallagher, a pilot, slipped on the ice, and falling broke one of his legs. The limb was set by Dr. Treemanan.

CHRISTMAS PRESENT.—On the near approach of Christmas, the Rev. E. M. Saunders received from the members of the Granville Street Church and congregation, \$254, as a token of esteem. Mrs. Saunders also received from the ladies a handsome bureau and a purse of \$52.—Chron.

FATAL RAILWAY ACCIDENT.—On Saturday evening a man named Owen Gilday, residing near Rocky Lake and employed in inspecting the railway track in that locality, was run over and instantly killed. It appears that the unfortunate man while walking over the road in the performance of his duty took a fit and fell on the track. The Pictou train came along while he was there and ran over him. He leaves a wife and eight children.

ATTEMPTED MURDER ON CHRISTMAS EVENING.—An altercation occurred between J. Michael, captain, and Daniel Duggan, second mate, on board the Brigantine "Nina," lying at O'Connor's wharf, on Christmas evening, which may result in the death of the mate. The captain had been drinking, and under the influence of alcohol committed the fearful deed. The mate after receiving two shot wounds in the forehead made his way to the street where he was found, and conducted bleeding to the Police Station. Some policemen boarded the vessel and arrested the Captain. After the deposition of the mate was taken he was unable to sign his full name. We gather from the statement of the Steward and the deposition of the wounded man the following facts. The Captain came on board in the evening drunk—gave the mate a drink as a Christmas box. Some conversation ensued about the mate's wages, during which the Captain became enraged, and threatened to shoot the mate. He followed him to the deck and fired the shot which took effect in the forehead, and then a ruck took place on the head with a weapon called a "skull cracker." In this state the mate made his way to the street where he was found and led to the Police Station. This unhappy man so brutally wounded here in the midst of Christmas festivities, has a wife and two children in Liverpool England.

A NOVA SCOTIAN GIRL KILLED IN MALDEN.—Katherine Howard, from Nova Scotia, a domestic in the family of the Rev. Mr. Foljamb of Malden, Mass., was killed on Tuesday evening while crossing the railroad track.—Chron.

The Church Chronicle has had the fortune to receive new strength in the form of "a bonus of \$150, in three separate sums," and has resolved by the grace of God to venture upon the voyage of another year.

The Kentville Star reports that Mr. Edgar Witt, of Waterville, recently fell from a staging on which he was working, and broke one of his arms.

ROBBERY AT MARIE JOSEPH.—About a week ago a quantity of goods were stolen from the store of Mr. Elisha Hawbold, at Marie Joseph. Coming to Halifax he discovered on board the schooner Napier lying at a wharf, some of the articles taken. On further search a quantity of the missing goods were found on board the schooner. The holders of the articles alleged that they found them floating in the water when coming out of Marie Joseph. A man named Kabier, belonging to the vessel, was arrested on suspicion of being the thief, and after examination was committed for trial before the Supreme Court. On Saturday he was admitted to bail to appear for trial in Guysborough County in the Spring Term.

On Wednesday as James McKendry, of Herring Cove, and his son, a lad 13 years old, were returning from the wreck of the bark Bramish their boat upset off Thrump Cap, and both were thrown into the water. They having, with difficulty, got on shore Mr. McKendry took his son on his back, and then started to find some house. On arriving at one it was found that the poor boy was frozen to death.

IMPORTANT INVENTION. Combination of Reeds and Pipes.

THE MASON & HAMLIN ORGAN CO., have the satisfaction of announcing the successful combination of REEDS AND PIPES, so long attempted by organ makers in vain, but which is now effected by the inventions of MR. CARL FOGELBERG, a Swedish organ-builder, now resident in the United States.



The introduction of pipes in the Cabinet Organ, by which are added to the rich, vivacious tones of reeds the more liquid and rare, though passionless, tones of the pipe, has long been deemed an object so important that experimenters have been unceasing for its attainment. There are few Organ-makers who have not given much time and attention to the matter, though heretofore without success. It is true that certain attachments have been presented as "pipes and reeds," but these have in no case been real pipes, but only tubes of tin or other material, incapable of producing any tones themselves, but only supposed to modify somewhat the tones of the reeds.

The difficulty, heretofore found insurmountable, arises from the fact that the pitch of pipes and reeds is differently affected by changes of temperature. Pipes are quite sensitive to such changes, and reeds much less so; while the change is in different directions. As the atmosphere becomes warmer the pitch of pipes becomes sensibly higher, while that of reeds, though affected very little, is yet a trifle lower. Thus, though pipes and reeds be tuned exactly together, a few hours may produce sufficient change in the temperature to throw them so much apart that they cannot be used together. It is evident that until this difficulty was overcome it was impracticable to combine reeds and pipes.

Mr. Fogelberg's invention includes the modification of the form of the pipe, and the employment of a valve or cover extending over all the pipes and regulating one of the openings to each, so that by a single movement the pitch of all can be raised or lowered sufficiently to compensate for atmospheric changes. When a change of temperature has thrown the pipes out of tune with the reeds, the simple turning of a screw is sufficient to raise or lower the pitch of the pipes to the exact pitch of the reeds.

Taken from one cut in an Emerald by command of Tiberius Cæsar and which was given from the Treasury of Constantinople, by the Emperor of the Turks, to Pope Innocent VIII, for the Redemption of his Brother, then a Captive to the Christians.

The following Extract, in proof of the Authenticity of the above Portrait, is translated from the Latin contemporary Historians of the period.

"News to the Senate of Rome concerning Jesus Christ in the days of Tiberius Cæsar the Emperor, as the governors of sundry provinces under the Senate and people of Rome used to advertise the Senate of such news as chanced in diverse countries.

"Publius Lentulus, being at that time president in Judea, wrote an epistle to the Senate and people of Rome, the words whereof were these:—

"There appeared in these our days a man of great virtue, named Jesus Christ, who is yet alive amongst us, and of the Gentiles is accepted for a Prophet of Truth, but his own disciples called him the Son of God. He raised the dead and cureth all manner of diseases. A man of stature somewhat tall and comely, with a very reverend countenance such as the beholders may both love and fear; his hair of the colour of plumbert full ripe, and plain almost down to his ears; but from the ears downward somewhat curled, and more orient of colour, waving on his shoulders. In the midst of his head, a small, or partition of his hair; after the manner of the Nazirites; his forehead, very plain and smooth; his face, without spot or wrinkle, beset with a comely red; his nose and mouth so formed as nothing can be reprehended; his beard somewhat thick agreeable in colour to the hair of his head, not of any great length; his eyes grey, clear and quick. In reproving, he is terrible; in admonishing, courteous and fair spoken; pleasant in speech, mixed with gravity. It cannot be remembered that any have seen him laugh, but many have seen him weep. In proportion of body, well-shaped and straight; his hands and arms right, and delectable to behold; in speaking, very temperate, modest and wise. A man for singular beauty surpassing the children of men."
