Therefore Resolved, -That it is the opinion of this Association that a discretionary power as to the kind and degree of punish ment to be inflicted on pupils should be left in the hands of the teacher;

Further Resolved, -That in this manner the interests of I ducation will be better subserved than by limiting the power of the teacher by further legal enactments; or by rules laid down by Boards of Commissioners or Trusteer.

After lengthened discussion the resolution was unanimously adopted.

Mr. H. A. Bayne then read an excellent" paper on " Classics in our schools."




