

protesting against certain acts of the Italian Government as violations of International law; among other acts the expulsion of Nuns of various nationalities from Convents, and the forcible suppression and closing of certain International religious houses.

It is now stated that the Pope will leave Rome when the Bill is presented concerning the removal of the Italian Parliament there.

GERMANY.—The fire in Geneva destroyed two blocks of houses, a Quay and Hotel Couvonne. There was terrible consternation, but the military preserved order.

Money is plenty in Germany, and rapidly drifting in American securities. Germany will early next month redeem 30 millions sterling of war claim.

The German Parliament will close its labors on the 25th.

Sessions of the Prussian Diet open on the 27th inst. The Moscow Gazette counsels Russia to demand the neutralization of Denmark and restoration of Northern Schleswig to the latter country.

Austria.—The approval of the British Government of Count Beust's appointment to the Austro Hungarian Embassy at London, has been received at Vienna.

TURKEY.—The cholera is spreading in Constantinople, the number of deaths is increasing daily.

A despatch reports three hundred and eighty deaths from cholera last week.

SEALED TENDERS addressed to the Post Office Inspector, and marked SEALED TENDER FOR MAIL SERVICE, will be received at HALIFAX until 12 o'clock, noon, on FRIDAY, the 15th DECEMBER, for the conveyance of Her Majesty's Mails six times per week, each way, between New Glasgow and Sydney, including the two Branch Routes between Antigonish and Guysboro', and Tracadie and Port Mulgrave, on and from the first day of February next.

The conveyance to be made between New Glasgow and Sydney in a first class stage, and Branch Lines by horse and wagon.

The route pursued in conveyance of this Mail to be as above.

The computed distance between New Glasgow and Sydney is 150 miles; Antigonish and Guysboro' 33 miles; Tracadie and Port Mulgrave, 16 miles.

The rate of travel to be not less than six miles per hour, including stoppages for all purposes.

The days and hours of Arrival and Departure to be as follows, subject to a right of the Postmaster General to alter the same, should he consider it advisable so to do.

Leave New Glasgow daily, after arrival of Mail Train from Halifax. Arrive at Sydney in thirty-eight hours. Leave Sydney daily at 4 p. m. Arrive at New Glasgow in time to connect with Mail Train from Pictou.
