The following Extract, in proof of the Authenticity of the above Portrait, is translated from the Latin contemporary Historians of the

" News to the Senate of Rome concerning JESUS CHRIST in the days of Tiberius Cæsar the Emperor, as the govenors of sundry provinces under the Senate and people of Rome used to advertise the Senate of such news as chanced in

diverse countries. "Publius Lentulus, being at that time president in Judea, wrote an epistle to the Senate and people of Rome, the words whereof were

"'There appeared in these our days a man of great vi.tue, named JESUS CHRIST, who is yet alive amongst us, and of the Gentiles is accepted for a Prophet of Tru h, but his own disciples called him the Son of God. He raiseth the dead and curcth all manner of diseases. A man of stature somewhat tall and comely, with a very reverend countenance, such as the behelders may both love and fear; his hair of the colour of phi bert full ripe, and plain almost down to his ears: but from the ears downward somewhat ourled, and more orient of colour, waving on his shoulders. In the midst of his head goeth a seam, or partition of his hair, after the manner of the Nazarites; his forehead, very plain and smooth; his face, without spot or wrinkle, beautified with a comely red : his nose and mouth so formed as nothing can be reprehended; his beard somewhat thick agreeable in colour to the bair of his head, not of any great length, in the midst of an ian cent and mature look; his eyes grey clear and quick. In reproving, he is terrible: in admonishing, courteous and fair spoken: pleasant in speach, mixed with gravity. It cannot be remembered that any have seen him laugh, but many have seen him weep. In proportion of body, well shaped and straight; his hands and arms right, and delectable to behold; in speaking, very temperate, modest and wise. 
