THE SOUTH BAPTIST INSTITUTE held its first public meeting on Tuesday last week in Granville Street Church. The President, E. D. King being required in the choir, the Vice-President, B. H. He shewed the necessity that existed for men who could grapple with the many difficult questions of the day; and that rewards lay along the path of those who would take a high stand in all the professions and callings demanding men of superior attainments. The choir rendered several anthems in good style, making, together with the addresses, an occasion of much interest and instruction.

A large powerful steamer is expected at St. John's N. F. early in May, to engage in the work of repairing the Atlantic Cables.

WILMOT.—The Hotel occupied by Mr. W. A. Rookwell, was destroyed by fire on the morning of Tuesday last.

THE ST. GEORGE'S SOCIETY has lately been resuscitated, and on Monday last observed the anniversary of their patron Saint, by walking in procession to St. Luke's Cathedral; where Bishop Binney preached an excellent sermon appropriate to the occasion. The turn-out was in advance of any in late years, and called forth universal admiration.

POLITIC.—The Citizen has been sold. The purchasers designate themselves "The Citizen Publishing Company." It now has the names of the government candidates Garvie, Flinn and Archibald at the head of its editorial matter. There is of course much speculation as to the effect of this movement on the approaching elections.

Hon. Joseph Howe is writing a series of letters addressed "To the People of Nova Scotia," in defence of his position and acts.

SMALL-POX ON SHIPBOARD.—The English Mail Steamer City of Dublin arrived from Liverpool on Sunday morning, having on board 33 cabin and 10 steerage passengers.

On arriving off the wharf it was perceived that she had a signal of sickness on board. Dr. Gossip, Inspecting Physician, ordered her to the quarantine ground. He then visited her and ascertained that a steerage passenger for New York had been attacked with a mild type of small-pox. The cabin passengers who had been entirely isolated from the affected person were allowed to land. The mails were also brought on shore in the steam-tug. The cargo for Halifax was also landed by lighters and the supply of coals sent on board by the same means.

The steamer Alexandria of the Anchor line arrived here on Saturday last, with freight from Glasgow. On Sunday morning a case of small-pox appeared in the person of one of the crew. Mr. DeWolf the consignee requested that the patient might be taken to the hospital, and guaranteed all the expenses.

The Board of Health met on Monday morning, to consider these cases and after brief discussion passed the following resolution: "Whereas the mail steamship City of Dublin in violation of the Dominion Statutes neglected to remain at the Quarantine ground, but proceeded up to the harbor to a point above George's Island;

And whereas the jurisdiction over this and similar cases is with the Inspecting Physician of the Port;

Therefore Resolved, that the Inspecting Physician be respectfully requested to cause the law to be enforced against the captain and owners of the City of Dublin as far as possible."

PORT MOUTON.—The Liverpool Advertiser reports that a lad fifteen years of age, son of George Molman, of Port Mouton, accidentally shot himself on the 11th inst, and died a few hours after.

ANOTHER BROKEN CABLE.—The Newfoundland Company's cable between Port au Basque and Gaspe Bay, Cape Breton Island, totally failed on the 19th instant. A steamer with repairing appliances will leave at once to re-establish a connection. The communication with Newfoundland via St. Pierre and Sydney C. B., is undisturbed.—Col.

DROWNED AT BERUDA.—A seaman named John Campbell, a native of Cape Breton, late of the schr. George Brown, was drowned in the harbor of Hamilton, on the night of the 6th inst. The body was recovered.

Telegraphic communication between P. E. Island and the mainland was again interrupted last week. It is supposed the cable has been damaged or broken by the anchor of some vessel.

DROWNED.—On the 7th ult., as the brig "S. A. Holbrook," of New York, was being towed out of East River, N. Y., the mate, Henry L. Owen Tooker, slipped from the rail, and before the tug-boat could be stopped sank, and up to 1st inst., the body had not been found. The deceased was in the 23rd year of his age, and was a son of the late Benjamin Tooker formerly of Yarmouth.

THE INMAN LINE OF STEAMSHIPS TO AVOID ICEBERGS.—The Inman line officially announces that its captains have received positive orders never to cross the longitude of 50 degrees W. North of the latitude of 40 degree N. The object of this is to avoid the danger of ice on the Banks of Newfoundland.

FISH FOR BRAINS.—Here is a sample of Mark Twain's "advice to correspondents," in the Galaxy:—"Young Author.—Yes Agassiz does recommend authors to eat fish, because the phosphorus in it makes brains. So far you are correct. But I cannot help you to a decision about the amount you need to eat—at least not with certainty. If the specimen composition you send is about your fair usual average, I should judge that perhaps a couple of whales would be all that you would want for the present. Not the largest kind, but simply good, middling-sized whales."

REMAINS OF THE ISRAELITES IN EGYPT.—A Zurich newspaper announces the startling discovery, said to have been made in the environs of Cairo, of the foundations of a town built by the Hebrews during their sojourn in the land of Egypt. The learned are engaged in deciphering some inscriptions found there which are expected to aid new light and confirmation to the Exodus. We wait for further confirmation. There is nothing improbable in the announcement, considering the complete preservation in Egypt of monuments of even remoter date.

A telegram last week from St. John's states that the coast of Newfoundland was completely blockaded by ice.
