The Horse Guards will be removed to the War Office, thereby abolishing the dual Government. The appointment of Commannderin-Chief will be limited to a term of five years. The available force to consist of one hundred thousand men.

On a motion of Mr. Herbert, on Thursday a general debate ensued as to the propricty of neutral Powers interposing to procure such moderate terms of Peace as may restore tranquility to Europe, and the independence of France.

On Friday night the pervading tone of the debate was that England's weak besitancy had lost her the respect of the belligerents and invited an early war against her.

The High Commission on U. States matters .- Sir Stanford Northcote accepts a position on the joint high commission between England and the United States, vacated by the resignation of Sir John Rose.

In the House of Lords Earl Granville said the High Commission about to meet in Washington is without power to settle questions of the Fisheries; but is only authorized to frame a plan of adjustment on which the decision must be unanimous, for submission to their respective Govern-

In the House of Commons on Thursday night Viscount Enfield, in replying to a question, repeated the statement that the Anglo-American commission was not authorized to settle the difficulties between the two countries. Their mission was simply to determine the mode of adjustment. I the mixed commission preferred, British claims would also be submitted to it.

Lord Lyons telegraphs to the foreign department that the French Assembly having voted almost unanimously for the appointment of M. Thiers as chief Executive, pending the decision of France upon definite institutions, he has announced verbally to Thiers the recognition of the Government by England.

INTENSE COLD IN ENGLAND. - The latest English papers bring intelligence of the great suffering produced by a fortnight's frost in L ndon. It is stated that on one day there were no fewer than thirteen coroners' inquests held on persons who had expired suddenly in consequence of the effects of excessive cold on weak action of the heart. the streets or in their houses. The railroad guards suffered severely, one being found dead in his van. There have also been numerous injuries from falls in the slippery streets, and surgeons in the metropolitan hospitials have bad a busy time of it attending to fractured limbs and broken heads. Deaths are also reported as resulting from the explosion of kitchen boilers in consequence of the supply pipes freezing. A large portion of the working class in London have suffered greatly from being thrown out of work on account of the suspension of navigation while the Thames was full of loose ice, and because of the cessation of all building operations while the intense frost lasted. In France, too, the cold is reported to be very severe, and painful stories are told of the wounded being frozen to death and of sentinels perishing at their posts.
