consideration of this matter. We fear there has been some connivance at mistranslation in this respect as formerly with reference to the translations into the languages of India. Truth is of more value than any Society, although it may have such noble work as giving the Word of God to the world. It should be borne in mind that our English version of the Bible is not so "pure" as it might be. To secure its purity all known errors should be corrected and the nearest approach possible to the original obtained.
