NEW BRUNSWICK.

ST JOHN .- Damaged Tea by Auction ,-Yesterday at noon, on the Market Square, Mr. George Stewart sold at auction, fifty six barrels and a number of chests damaged tea, discharged from the barque "Ruby." Mr. Ryerson, shipbuilder, of Yarmouth N. S., was the purchaser for \$90, the duty of 31 cents per pound and 15 per cent, ad valorem, to be paid by the purchaser. The tea sold for about 81 cents per lb. A large portion of it was in very good condition .- St. John Telegraph.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND. - Napoleon is said to have asked for, and obtained, permission to leave Germany, for the purpose of visiting his wife and son at Chiselhurst. The Empress Eugene, and the Prince Imperial were at Dover, waiting his arrival.

In the House of Lords, on Monday 13th, Earl Granville announced that the Conference of Powers on the Eastern question had closed, and that a treaty had been signed at the foreign office abrogating the restriction on the admission of foreign men-of-war into the Dardanelles and Bosphorus. The Porte in times of peace may admit into these waters naval vessels of friendly powers, whenever needed to enforce thetreaty of 1856. The Danubian commission is prolonged for 12 years. The Protocol expressly declares that no power can release itself of obligation of treaty without consent of all the signa-

A dispatch on the 18th says: the protocols on the Black Sea questions are signed by Plenipotentiaries of the seven powers represented. Their general features are conciliatory on the part of Russia. There is a willingness on the part of Turkey to accept deneutralization in the Black Sea and a deference to the wishes of other powers.

The St. Petersburg Post of Friday last in reference to the decision of the Black Sea conference says :

"Notwithstanding newspaper invectives the Powers have interpreted the letter of Prince Gortschakoff as reasonable and up right."

The "Times" in an article on the labors of the High Commission, anticipates, an easy settlement of the fishery question, but is not sanguine as to the Alabama claims. The "Times" expresses regret at the limited power held by the Commis-

In the House of Lords, Earl Carnaarvon stated that of three hundred thousand barrels of powder stoted in Government arsenals, all but eight hundaed barrels were worthless. He deplored this at a time when the state of Europe made war more than rossible.

The Government is taking precautionary measures against infection from unburied corpes, as also against rinderpest.

The Orleans railway has been given up to France.

The newspaper stamps duty has been rearranged.

By later despatches we learn that the troubles of France are far from being over with the departure of the Prussian army. Cival war appears imminent. The work of former revolutions is again being enacted and the blood of official personages is being shed, whilst those in authority are being overawed and are liable at any hour to become the victims of popular fury. Portions of the army too are not to be relied on. What the end is to be is not easy to divine. The following are the latest items of news.

The Prussian Cross Gazette-semi-official -says that if the French persecute the returning Germans, the German army must re-occupy the environs of Paris, and possi-

Events of the most unfortunate character have taken place in Paris, and the situation is hourly becoming graver. The Government has issued a proclamation, repudiating the report of an intended coup d'etat-warning those who seek the pillage of Paris that they will rain France; and appealing to the National Gaurds to put an end to the condition of anarchy into which they have plunged the Capital. The proclamation concludes: " After this warning, we shall proceed to force peace at all hazards."

Napoleon left Wilhamshoe to-day for Londou.

Paris is in a state of anarchy.

Generals Chansey, Clermont, Thomas and Lecompte have been seized and shot by the insurgents. Paladines is held a prisoner. All persons of prominence are fleeing from the city.

The insurgents have proclaimed the revolution as successful.

As yet there has been no pillaging in Paris, but business is at a stand. Many of the streets are barricaded.

Another account, to the Chronicle, says Gen. Faron was surrounded for several hours by a mob in Montmartre. His troops proved faithful. They charged and took three barricades, using the bayonet, and finally cut their way out and escaped.

General Lecompte and others were not as fortunate. Abandoned by their men, they were made prisoners by the rioters and are now detained in the Chateau Rouge. General Parlurel was wounded.

The journals this morning, 19th, report the execution of Gens. Lecompte and Thomas. After their capture they were taken to the garden of rue Des Rosiers, Montmartre, where the central revolutionary committee hold their sittings. After a brief trial, they were condemned to suffer death and were taken out and shot. All accounts say they died bravely.


