LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.—Napoleon is said to have asked for, and obtained, permission to leave Germany, for the purpose of visiting his wife and son at Chiselhurst.

In the House of Lords, on Monday 13th, Earl Granville announced that the Conference of Powers on the Eastern question had closed, and that a treaty had been signed at the foreign office...

An immense number of insurgents have left for Versailles, with the intention of endeavoring to overawe the Assembly, which will sit to-morrow.

General Duval is at the head of the insurgents. As yet there has been no pillaging in Paris, but business is at a stand.

Another account, to the Chronicle, says: Gen. Faron was surrounded for several hours by a mob in Montmartre.

The journals this morning, 19th, report the execution of Gens. Lecompte and Thomas. After their capture they were taken to the garden of rue Des Rosiers, Montmartre...

The Journal "Debate" says yesterday will be considered as one of the gloomiest ones in the history of France.

A special despatch to the London journals say that General Vinoy has also been shot.

10. 30 p. m.—The latest news is that the nationals of Montmartre have seized and now occupy the staff and general headquarters in building of National Guards of Paris in Place Vendome.

It is estimated that 60,000,000 francs will be realized from Crown property, and by the abolition of donations.

All soldiers whose time has expired have left the city for their homes.

Two mails leave Paris daily for England.

The German prefect at Rouen prohibited the publication of the French official documents by the journals in his department, on penalty of suppression.

There is still trouble brewing in the Montmart quarter of Paris, but the Ministry is not disposed to employ force to bring the insurgents to subjection.

Rochefort is now out of danger. Councils of Ministers are to be held in Versailles prefecture.

The receptions of Foreign Ministers will hear after be held at their residence in Paris. The battle-fields in the north of France threaten to become a focus of pestilence.

The Government is taking precautionary measures against infection from unburied corpses, as also against rinderpest.

The Orleans railway has been given up to France.

The newspaper stamps duty has been rearranged.

By later despatches we learn that the troubles of France are far from being over with the departure of the Prussian army.

Civil war appears imminent. The work of former revolutions is again being enacted and the blood of official personages is being shed, whilst those in authority are being overawed and are liable at any hour to become the victims of popular fury.

Portions of the army too are not to be relied on. What the end is to be is not easy to divine. The following are the latest items of news.

The Prussian Cross Gazette—semi-official—says that if the French persecute the returning Germans, the German army must re-occupy the environs of Paris, and possibly the city.

Events of the most unfortunate character have taken place in Paris, and the situation is hourly becoming graver. The Government has issued a proclamation, repudiating the report of an intended coup d'etat—warning those who seek the pillage of Paris that they will ruin France; and appealing to the National Guards to put an end to the condition of anarchy into which they have plunged the Capital.

The proclamation concludes: "After this warning, we shall proceed to force peace at all hazards."

Napoleon left Wilhamschloe to-day for London.

Paris is in a state of anarchy. Generals Chansey, Clermont, Thomas and Lecompte have been seized and shot by the insurgents.

Paladines is held a prisoner. All persons of prominence are fleeing from the city.

The insurgents have proclaimed the revolution as successful.

Thiers' Government has issued a counter proclamation calling on all who have regard for the honor and interest of France to separate from the insurgents, who are denounced as assassins, and rally around the Assembly.

An immense number of insurgents have left for Versailles, with the intention of endeavoring to overawe the Assembly, which will sit to-morrow.

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The "Echo" says in consequence of the disturbances in Paris, the Emperor William has provisionally stopped the movements of German troops.

ITALY.—The Italian Ministry ask extraordinary credit of 150,000,000 to 200,000,000 livres for completion of armaments.

In the Chamber of Deputies the Minister of Finance said there was a total deficit of 270 million of livres.

GERMANY.—The Emperor William arrived at Berlin on Friday last, when there was great rejoicing, congratulatory letters were received from the Czar of Russia.
