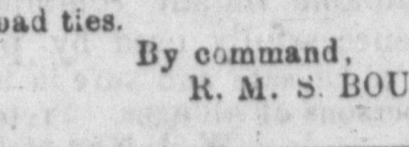

"Heavy Oil," or "Carbolite Oil," a product of coal tar used in the manufacture of Wood block pavement, and of wood for buildings and railroad ties.
