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Do not refuse to listen to me, venerable brethren! Do not by your murmurs and interruptions, justify those who declare, with Father Hyacinthe, that this Council is not free, but that our votes are imposed upon us in advance. If this were so, this august assembly, toward which the eyes of the whole world are turned which fall into the most shameful contempt. If we would be great, we must be free.

I thank his grace, Bishop Dupanloup, for that nod of approval! It gives me courage to go on.

EDUCATION.

The subject of public instruction is one

of the questions about to engage the atten tion of Parliament. The bill proposed by the Government purposes to provide for secular education only, and this, under certain circumstances, to be compulsory, thereby throwing the onus of religious teaching upon the clergy and parents, as it should be. In a country like this, where the people are so divided in their religious doctrines, no other system can be successful. It yet remains to be seen, whether the Government, in face of the determined opposition which is being manifested by the Church of England and Roman Catholies, is strong enough to carry this measure in its present form. There is an almost universal conviction growing up among the people here, that the material and substantial prosperity of the country depends in a great degree upon the educational training of its people, and this in its most enlarged sense; and this conviction, I may say, has been greatly confirmed by the recent events which have taken place in Europe. In order to effect this very laudable object, no expense is spared by the State. In proof of which. I may say, the estimates for this year provide for the expenditure of £191,000 for public instruction alone.
