

CHEAP FIRE FOR SITTING ROOMS. -In view of the alarming high price of coal, we (Rock) would again call at-

consumpton of that article which we have successfully tried for several winters. Most grates, especially in old houses, are large and open. Obtain at the nearest iron-foundry or gas works a quantity of clinkers, the residuum of the furnaces. They will usually be given to you, as they are of no value to the producers. Place them at the side and back of the grate ; a little wire may be used to hold them in position, if necessary. Having thus reduced the dimensions of the heat, light the fire with wood and coal in the ordinary manner. In an hour or two the 'clinkers' will become red-hot, and throw out a great heat, although but a small supply of coals will be required for the centre. The advantage of using ' clinkers' instead of bricks or other material is that the fire is more sightly. Whether 'laid' or lit, the grate has the the appearance of being filled with coal. It is easy to save 50 per cent of coal by the process. Small coal readily burns throughout fires so contructed, being held in the interstices of the ' clinkers.'

CORN SOUP .--- Cut down the middle of each row of corn from twelve ears, and scrape each cob with a knife. Boil the cebs in just water enough to cover them and season with a teaspoonful of salt, and a little pepper. Boil half an hour, add corn and boil another. half hour. Turn in two quarts of sweet milk, boil fifteen minutes more. Stir two tablespoonfuls of butter into two of flour, until well mixed up; add a little water to make it perfectly smooth; mix with the soup, stirring well. Beat three eggs to a foam and stir rapidly into the soup; serve directly. This is a most delicious soup, and adds greatly to a poor dinner.

COFFEE, A DISINFECTANT-Accordding to the Poona Observer, recent experiments made in India have proved that roasted coffee is one of the most powerful disinfectants, not only rendering animal and vegetable effluvia innoxious, but actually destroying them. A room in which meat in an advanced state of decomposition has been kept for some time was instantly deprived of all smell on a coffee-roaster being carried through it containing a pound of nearly roasted coffee. In another room the effluvium occasioned by the clearing out of acesspool was completely removed within half a minuse by the use of three ounces of fiesh coffee. The way coffee is used as a desintectant is by drying the raw bean, then pounding in a motar, and afterward Goods sold at Lowest Current Rates, roasting the powder upon a moderately heated iron plate until it assumes a dark hue. The coffee must. however be pure, as chicory possesses no deodorizing power.

India rubber trees, it is stated, occupy a belt of land around the globe, for five hundred miles south of the equator. These trees yield on an average three tablespoonfuls of sap a day, and can be tapped for twenty successive seasons. They stand so close to each other that one man can gather the sap from eight trees. In a tract of country thirty miles long and eight miles wide there have been fortythree thousand India rubber trees conted. In Europe and the United states there a one hundred and fifty manufactories of India rubber goods, employing five hundred operatives each consuming over ten million pounds of gum every year.


