NEW BRUNSWICK.

The gale of wind on Friday night appears to have been very destructive. The walls of the new building for the Young Men's Christian Association were blown down and fell upon and crushed an adjoining house The Suspension Bridge too was much damaged.

The American ship "Humber" broke away from the Anchor line wharf and smashed C. Robitson's store ahead of her, and now lies in a dangerous position.

One schooner went to pieces in sight of the people on the Ballast wharf. Three men were drowned and two barely rescued by the life boat.

Several schooners ran ashore a mile from the city at Red Head, and the life boat was sent for.

SAD CASE OF DROWNING AT TOBIQUE - On Sunday week as a man named Mallery wes towing a raft with a span of horses through the rapids of the Tobique, near its junction with the St. John, the team got beyond its depth, and he was swept by the current from the back of the horse on which he was riding, and sank in the swift running stream. The horse swam ashore, but the m n was drowned. His body was recovered the same night some distance below the place where the accident occurred. The unfortunate man leaves a wife and tamily of nine children .- St. John Telegraph.

AULAC, Nov. 26 .- About two o'clock a fatal accident occurred at a Quarry near Aulae Station on the Intercolonial Rail--way-by which one man named Charles Carter was instantly killed, and two others seriously injured, one a Frenchman having his leg badly broken. The men were engagaged in raising a huge stone by means of a derrick when the tackling broke and the stone fell, erusbing Carter, who died almost instantly. Carter was a young man about 13 years of age and belougs to Westmorland Point. Aulac Station is three miles beyond Sackville, and the quarry where the accident occurred is on Fowler's Hill, about 300 yards from the Station .- News.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF IRE AND .-- This Church has made great and most encouraging progress since its has been thrown upon its own resources. Accustomed to self-government it has escaped the trials that have come upon the Episcopal Church. "Holmestrand," from New York, and The Capitalized " Regium Donum," now amounts to £561,000. The interest already received amounts to over £21,000 a year, and when the whole capital is invested the receipts will be about £25,000. The "Sustentation Fund" raised year by year now amounts to £24,000, and is expected next year to reach £30,000. There is thus a "Supplementary fund" available to the Irish Church from which every congregation receives about \$100. This enables the congregations to pay a very fair stipend to their ministers. 25 and only 25 ministers have relused to commute. 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UNITED STATES.

Congress assembled on Monday at Washington

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President Grant's message was of unusual length, but mainly devoted to domestic affairs. In relation to the fisheries and other matters affecting the United States and Brittish provinces, he recommends early legislation to carry into effect the recent treaty. He congratulates the country on the results of Geneva arbitration, and settlement of San Jaun boundary, and speaks in high praise of the hon-rable and prompt acquiescence of Great Britain in the decisions,

Horace Greely died on Friday night at 6.50, aged 61 years, at the house of Dr. Choate, in Chappaqua.

The Saturday's telegram informs us that the deaths by small pox in Boston during the week were fifty-three. Six hundred-cases existed in the city.
