ON the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Customs, and under an Act in virtue of the authority conferred by the Act 31st Victoria, Chapter 9, intituled, "An Act respecting the Customs," His Excellency has been pleased to make the following Regulations:

In addition to the Warehouse Ports mentioned in the 54th section of the Act passed during the session of the Parliament of Canada held in the 31st year of Her Majesty's reign, and intituled, "An Act respecting the Customs," and also in addition to the Ports named in the Lists sanctioned by subsequent orders in Council passed under the authority of the said Act, the following Port shall be, and it is hereby declared to be, included in the Lists of Warehousing Ports in the Dominion of Canada, viz.—The Port of Wallaceburg, in the Province of Ontario.
