The City Council have resolved on the extension of Morris street Westward to Seymour Street. The land required will cost \$300.

A young man named Donald McIsaac, of Low Point, was accidentally drowned by falling out of a boat while crossing the Strait of Canso on Monday week.

The Fruit Growers' Association Exhibition at Wolfville, which was to have taken place on the 10th and 11th October, has been postponed till the 16th and 17th of that month.

COLCHESTER EXHIBITION.—The Colchester County Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition and Cattle Show, opened at Truro on Thursday, and was attended by a very large gathering of people from adjacent sections of the country.

There were upwards of a hundred exhibitors, and the number of animals and articles on show exceeded four hundred. The manufactures were excellent, and comprised wagons, sleighs, harness, furniture, boots and shoes, trunks, cheese, cloths, yarns, agricultural implements, and other articles in good variety.

The Exhibition was held in the Drill Shed, and on the ground adjacent thereto. Outside the Exhibition ladies of the Episcopal, Wesleyan and Baptist Churches held Bazaars, which were liberally patronized.—Colonist.
