IN MEMORIAM.

MR. TOBIAS HEININGER,

of Chester Grant, departed this life, Nov. 4th, 1872, at the advanced age of 94 years. He was baptized in 1834 by the late Rev. Joseph Dimock. For the most part of the time during the latter years of his life he had been confined to the house by affliction; but the Bible was his companion, and religion his comfort in his solitary hours. David Nutter, of fragrant memory, was on a visit, and he at once arose and was baptized by this servant of Christ, and united with the church here, of which he continued to be a most worthy and consistent member until he was summoned to "join the blood-washed throng of the church above." It is said that for forty years he was never absent from a conference when there was a possibility to be present in his place. He ever evinced the deepest interest in the arrangements and plans of the little church. But his work on earth is now ended and his is doubtless "a full reward" beyond the ills and dangers of this mortal state.

Dominion & Foreign News.

HALIFAX, N. S., NOV. 27, 1872.

BENEVOLENT.—Lord Dufferin, Governor General of Canada, has sent to the relief Committee of Boston, a cheque for \$5,000, as an expression of sympathy for the losses sustained by the recent fire.

The steamers plying between Montreal and Quebec were to go into winter quarters on Saturday last.

The Governor-General left Montreal for Ottawa on Friday last. He returns in January.

The Jesuits are petitioning Parliament to grant a charter for a university in Montreal.

The opposition in the Quebec Legislature introduced a bill to abolish dual representation, which has passed a second reading.

News has been received from London to the effect that Sir G. E. Cartier's health continues to improve.

The Bank of Montreal has decided to issue \$4,000,000, worth of new stock.

It is said that the Intercolonial Railway from Riviere du Loup to Trois Pistoles will be opened next week.

Parliament has been further prorogued till the 31st December.

UNITED STATES.

A special session of the Massachusetts Legislature assembled on Tuesday the 19th to legislate upon issuing building bonds, and insurance matters and other exigencies of the Boston fire.

The large storehouses and grain elevator of Woodruff & Robinson, Brooklyn, N. Y., was burned on Friday. Loss \$500,000; one half grain.

Two firemen were killed, and another wounded by falling walls.

Carter, Mann & Co's store, State Street Block, Boston, was burned on Thursday night. Loss \$100,000.

Two thirds of the business portion of the town of Galoi, Henry County, Ill, was burned on Thursday; loss \$150,000.

A fire in St. Louis Wednesday night, destroyed Roa & Co's pork packing establishment. Loss, \$100,000.

A freight train on the Ohio and Mississippi Railroad, at Deputy Indiana, on Wednesday, crushed two cars, and wounded several passengers, one of whom will die.

Stanley, the discoverer of Livingstone, was in New York last week.

The Common Council, of London, voted resolutions laudatory of services of Stanley. The resolutions will be inscribed on vellum, and forwarded to him.

Another boat load of survivors of the Steamship Missouri, has arrived at Nassau.

The Illinois female college at Jacksonville, belonging to the Illinois Conference of the Methodist Church, was also burned on Monday. Loss, \$50,000.

A collision occurred on Philadelphia Wilmington, and Baltimore Railroad on Thursday by which two persons were killed and many wounded.

Jay Gould, was arrested in New York, on Thursday last at the suit of the President of the Erie R. R. for embezzling 9,580,000 dollars while in control of that Road.

There was great excitement in Wall Street, on Friday, in consequence of a corner in North Western Common, that stock was going at 95 to 200.

Pre-ident Theirs has given 1,000 francs for relief of Boston sufferers.

It is reported that the Superintendent of the European and North American Railroad has issued orders requiring all the employees of the road to the Temperance Pledge.

Forty-seven deaths from Small Pox occurred in Boston during the past week. Half of the victims resided in the North end of the city.

The Boston Coliseum was auctioned on Saturday for \$10,500.

The steamer "Batavia," at Boston, Nov. 25, from Liverpool, rescued eight men from the waterlogged barque "Charles Ward," wrecked in a cyclone on the passage from Quebec for Sutherland. Eleven of the crew were drowned.

Brig "Harold," from St. John, for Cardenas went ashore on Saturday at Quoddy and has been towed to Eastport, badly damaged.

MEXICO.—The Mexican Congress assembled and elected Lerdo De Ter Jada, President of Republic.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

ENGLAND.—There has been trouble in relation to the London Police force. It grew out of the dismissal of a constable who acted as Secretary during an effort to secure an increase of pay. Eighty of the members of the force were discharged for insubordination. The movement for an increase of pay has extended to the postmen, who, with the police, were to hold a mass meeting in Hyde Park on Sunday to discuss what course shall be pursued.

John Bright resumes his seat in the Parliament at the coming session.

Mr. Baily, one of the speakers at the Fenian amnesty demonstration at Hyde Park on the 3rd inst., was fined on Friday for infringing the regulations for protection of public parks. An appeal was taken to the higher court. Meetings have been held in Greenwich and Clerkenwell, condemning the Government in prosecuting the Hyde Park speaker.

Information is received at London that the Bark Samuel Larrabe from Savannah, 9th January last, for Bremen, and the Bark Laneracast which left Baltimore 19th February, for Belfast, were lost at sea, and every person on Board the two vessels perished.

There were destructive gales throughout Wales on Thursday. Despatches from various points report the destruction of houses and other property.

A Fenian leader of the north of England named O'Hanlon, who was killed in a brawl with one Sweeney, was buried at Darlington. His funeral was the occasion of an immense assemblage of Fenians who made exciting demonstrations against the Police.

The weather on Monday and yesterday was very tempestuous. The telegraph lines were prostrated in many places and much damage to shipping on the coast is reported.

H. M. S. "Himalaya" arrived at Davenport on Monday with loss of eight of her crew. A boat was capsized by a heavy sea, while proceeding to the shore, and ten persons were drowned.

The "City of Brooklyn," which sailed on the 15th for New York, lost the fans of her propeller, and put back under sail, arrived last night. All on board are well, and will embark on another vessel. The "Brooklyn" goes to Liverpool for repairs.

FRANCE.—The payment of the third million of war indemnity has been completed. France will have half a million more ready by December.

There is no truth in the reported resignation of Theirs.

The members of the Right in the Assembly decided to oppose a formal proclamation of the Republic, but express their willingness to name Theirs President of France for life if he will henceforth abstain from Parliamentary debate.

The report is revived that the Right will

propose a Triumvirate, should President Theirs and ministry resign.

Changarnier introduced into the French Assembly a motion censuring Gambetta, and in his address charged the Government with laxity in dealing with the Radicals. Gambetta did not reply, but Theirs did, resenting Changarnier's reflection upon the Government, and demanded a vote of confidence, which he finally obtained.

The Trial by Jury Bill was passed in the French Assembly by a vote of 446 to 178.

The Left has now declared its programme for the future. It comprises all main reforms demanded by Laboulaye and other advocates of an adoption of the American Constitution, and expresses its belief that a dissolution of the Assembly is the only way out of the present difficulties.

President Theirs endorses the plan lately proposed by the committee of the Left Centre, for formation of a second chamber of the National Legislature. He also favors some definite settlement of relations between Legislative and Executive departments of government, as to questions of general policy of International affairs. Theirs adheres to Conservative ground taken in his recent message to the Assembly.

DENMARK.—The ruin caused by the hurricane is tremendous, and the loss of life very great. The King has ordered everything possible to be done for the sufferers.

GERMANY.—The Emperor William, will increase the Upper House of the German Diet, by creating new Peers, whose names will be published next week.

A special Envoy from Hayti has arrived at Berlin, to open diplomatic relations with Germany.

The Ecclesiastical Bill prohibiting the issuing of decrees of excommunication against subjects of Prussia has been submitted to the Diet.

A committee of the Geographical societies of Germany has reported in favor of carrying out a methodical expedition to Africa.

SPAIN.—The illness of King Amadeus is quite serious and a special Cabinet Session has been called.

News of the Week.

FOG WHISTLE.—It has been decided to anchor an iron light ship, containing a powerful fog whistle, near the entrance of Halifax harbor.

SUPREME COURT.—The prisoners convicted at the late sittings of Supreme Court were sentenced on Tuesday, by his Honor Judge McCully. The man Mulcahy, convicted of feloniously entering the residence of Mr. Longard and making a murderous assault on the family, was sentenced to five years in the Penitentiary. Charles Black, convicted of receiving stolen gold, knowing it to be stolen, and prompting persons to steal amalgam plates was sentenced to four years in the penitentiary. The boy Murphy, convicted of stealing money from Mr. Graham's ship was sentenced to four years in the Reformatory in connection with the City Prison. Morris, Black's accomplice; having turned Queen's Evidence, was discharged. On the Civil side the Court refused an application to set aside the verdict in the case of Tremaine vs the Gas Company, in which the plaintiff was awarded \$6000.
