On Letters—six cents per 4 oz. On Newspapers, if from office of publication to regular subscribers—the ordinary commuted rates.

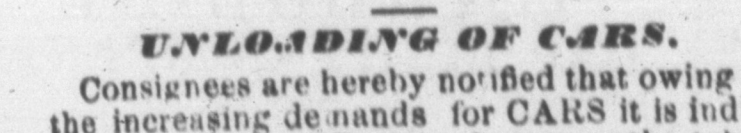
All other Newspapers posted in Canada—two cents each. On Books and Printed Matter—one cent per oz.

On Post Card—the impressed one cent stamp. On Registered Letters—two cents in addition to the postage rate.

The above rates prepaid in Canada, on Letters, Newspapers, &c., addressed to Newfoundland, will carry the same to the place of destination in Newfoundland, without further charge on delivery.

In like manner Letters, Newspapers, &c., coming prepaid from Newfoundland, will be delivered without charge at place of destination in Canada.

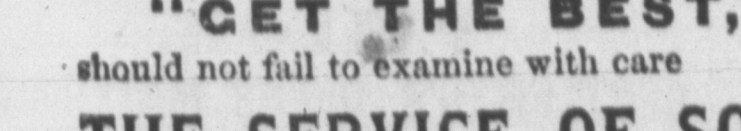
