On Newspapers, if from office of publication to regular subscribers-the ordinary commuted

All others Newspapers pested in Canada--two On Books and Printed Matter-one cent per

On Post Card-the impressed one cent stamp. On Regis ered Letters-two cents in addition

to the postage rate. The above rates prepaid in Canada, on Letters, Newspapers, &c., addressed to Newfoundland will carry the same to the place of destination in Newfoundland, without futher charge

In like manner Letters, Newspapers, &c., coming prepaid from Newfoundland, will be delivered without charge at place of destina-

tien in Canada. All transmissions must be prepaid and mat-ter posted without prepayment will not be for-
