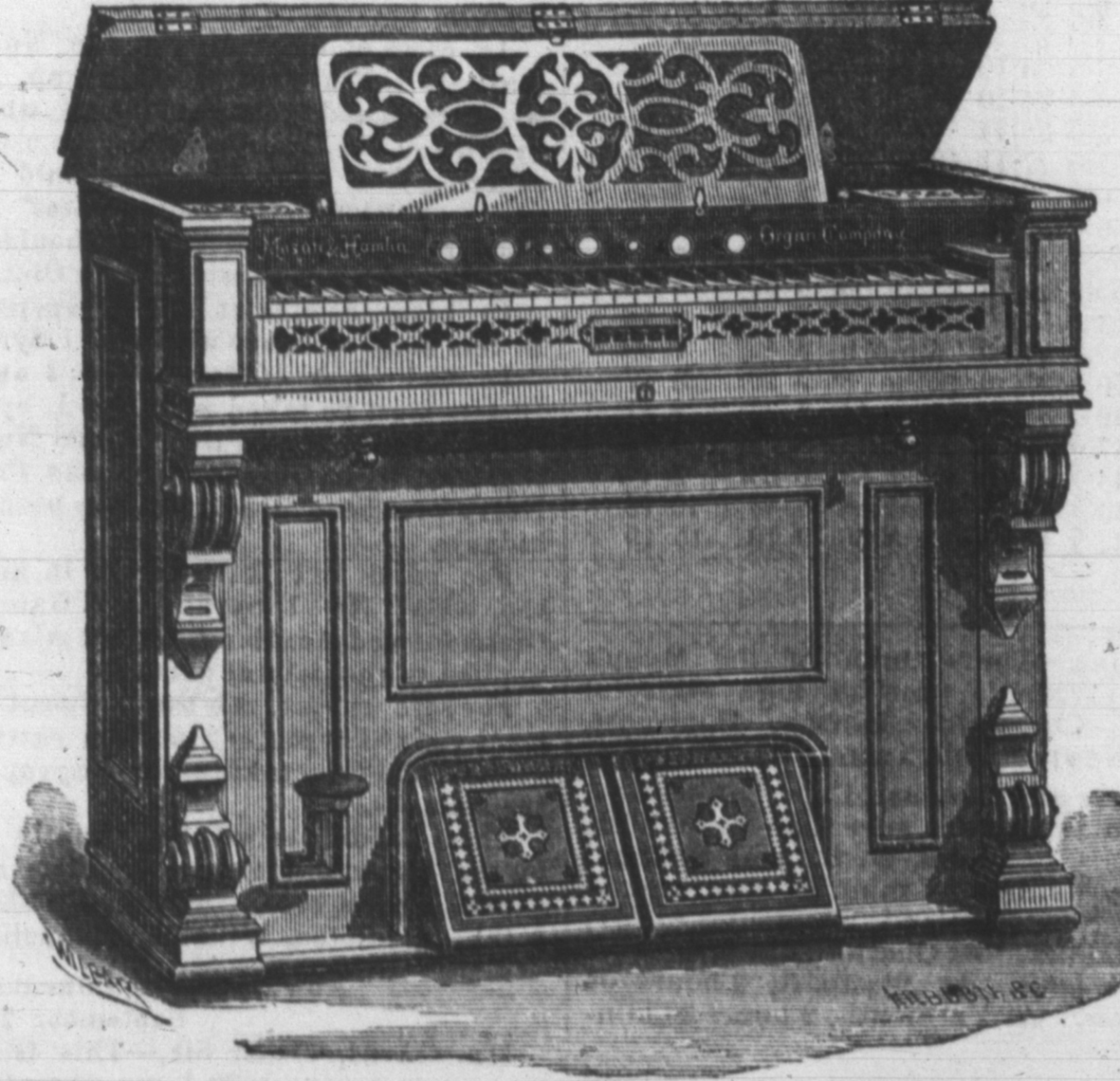

It enables the performer, by a simple movement of the key-board to the right or left, to raise or lower the pitch of the entire instrument a half or whole step, or tone. The transposition from one key to another, so often necessary in accompanying vocal music, in order to bring it within the compass of the voices, is thus made perfectly easy. The performer, indeed, continues to play in the key in which the music is written, while the music is really given a half or whole step or tone, below or above, as desired.
