

Rev. David Freeman said that being one of the examiners this year he felt constrained to speak of the thoroughness of the training given to the students in the Academy.

Good speeches were also given by Mr. J. F. Parsons, Rev. Isa. Wallace, and a most fervent eloquent appeal by Rev. S. B. Kempton.

J. W. Barss, Esq., expressed his undiminished interest in the educational work of the body, and said he had never felt the slightest regret that he had devoted his means towards this work, and would not, if he could, withdraw a dollar.

Rev. Dr. Day said he felt unable to do justice to this great subject, but was assured that Yarmouth County would not be behind.

A. A. Pineo, Esq., offered to give \$100. John Thomas, Esq., offered \$50. Other sums were also named.

J. W. Barss offered to give as much as all the laymen together would contribute. Upon this a subscription list was handed round the meeting, and a sum approaching \$1000 we believe, was raised.

It was stated that the Governors were appointing Agents for each county to present the claims of the College, and endeavored to increase the Endowment.

Profoundly impressed with this view we respectfully suggest to the Governors the desirableness of inaugurating, with the least possible delay, a series of mass Educational meetings to be held in the different counties under the direction of an agent or agents with a view to raise this year at least \$25,000 toward said Endowment.

THE FORRESTER MEMORIAL.

It appears by a letter in the Morning Chronicle of Friday last, from Rev. A. S. Hunt, that the Government some time since withdrew the permission they had previously given to place this monument on the Normal School grounds, because, as Mr. H. intimates, the Monument Committee had not consulted the Superintendent of Education respecting said monument.

In the Chronicle of Monday a letter appears from J. S. Hutton, Esq., principal of the Deaf and Dumb Asylum, in which he corrects Mr. Hunt's statements, and says that—

The Government withdrew their permission, granted in February last, to erect the Monument on the Normal School grounds, on the ex parte statements of five individuals out of eleven officers and committee of the Educational Association, of whom

Not one was a member of the Association when the Memorial Committee was appointed; they knew nothing, personally, of the history of the movement, and have not as yet contributed a single cent to the object.

Mr. Hutton continues:— "Mr. Hunt alleges that he has not been consulted by the Memorial Committee. How Mr. Hunt could hazard such an assertion I am at a loss to conceive, while he has in his hands the official invitation of the committee, courteously extended to him so soon as they became aware of his apparent desire to co-operate with them.

Mr. Hunt in Tuesday's Chronicle replies:—

"When I wrote my former letter, I had not received even a hint that the Committee wished me to be present. Mr. Parsons wrote me on the 18th inst., the letter was mailed on the 20th, and I received it on the 22nd."

We shall probably hear more of this matter.

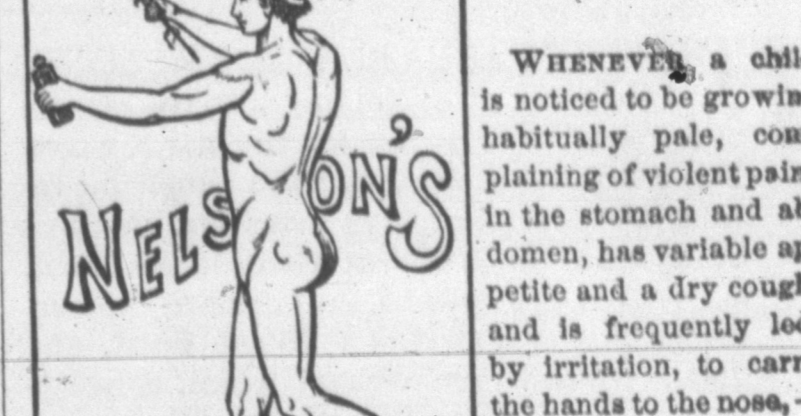
