

A DEAD WHALE WAS fallen in with off this harbor on Tuesday afternoon by two American fishing scho-mers, which attempted to tow it into this port, but it broke away from them in the night. Yesterday morning the steam tug G. W. Johnston went out in search of the monster, and found it ashore at Chelobogue Point in charge of some of the residents of that locality. It was purchased from the "salvors" by Messrs Jas. E. Clements, Jos. R. Kinney and H. Parr, and will be towed to this harbor. It is about 45 feet long, and is expected to yield from 40 to 50 bbls of oil.—Yarmouth Herald.

A LARGE CODFISH.—Cap. A. M. Peters, of Green Cove, in this township, on Friday last caught on the "Lureher," a codfish which when completely dressed and cleaned weighed 50 pounds. The liver weighed 5 lbs. 9 os. Before being dressed the fish weighed about 80 lbs.—Yarmouth Herald.

A report is current that the steamer "GREAT EASTERN" after landing the cable here next summer, will take a cargo of coal from Sydney to England, having already been chartered for that purpose.

STORM SIGNALS.—The following is from the "Express":

HALIFAX, 9th Sept., 1872.

SIRS,—As some time must elapse before all preparation can be completed for storm signals on the coasts of the Dominion, as a provisional measure written notices will be posted at a few of the principal ports on receipt of telegrams from the Central Observatory at Toronto. In Halifax I propose to post such notices at the Merchants' Exchange Reading Room in Hollis Street, and perhaps at other points in the city.

While the publication of these notices is a reason for extra vigilance, it should be distinctly understood that the absence of a notice is no guarantee of exemption from dangerous storms.

STEAMER FOR MINAS BASIN.—A steamer intended to ply on Minas Basin will, in a few weeks be launched from the shipyard of Mr. John Dart, Urbana. Her tonnage is one hundred tons. Her engine and boiler are in course of construction at the Works of Messrs. Montgomery, Freshwater. She is substantially built. She is owned by the Minas Steamboat Company and expected to be ready for the fall trade.

A NEW FEATURE IN THE COAL TRADE.—We are informed that orders for some 10,000 tons of coal have been received in Pictou for the English market. Nova Scotia coal has already been sold at a profit in London.

SINGULAR OCCURRENCE.—On Tuesday, the 20th ult., as Mr. Joseph A. Smith, of Port LaTour, was going out in his boat to the fishing grounds, when about two miles East of Baccaro Light, he came across a box, in which was the body of a child. He placed the box in his boat, and returned homeward to the landing Dr. Wilson, Coronor, assembled a jury and the box was opened and found to contain a girl about three years of age, light brown hair, a hood, with cape of black merino and yellow edging round it, dress resembling grey wool, with black ribbon, with dotted black spots in the ribbon round the waist, red worsted stockings, and black prunella boots on the feet. The body to all appearance had not been in the box more than a week or ten days. No visible marks of injury, with the exception of a flesh wound over the frontal bone a little above the eyes caused by a lump of coal (so supposed), and to all appearances died by the visitation of God. Verdict of the jurors in accordance with the above. The child was buried in the Wesleyan burying ground, Baccaro.

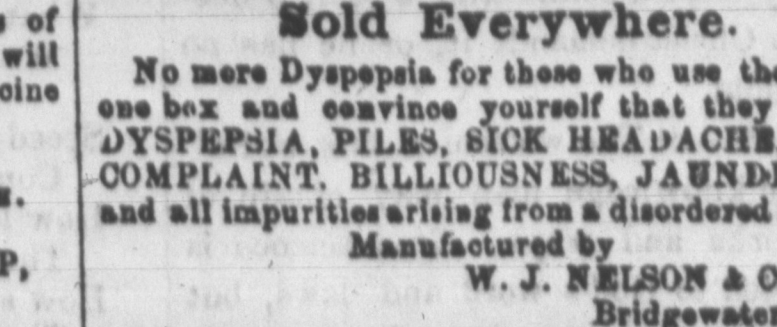
