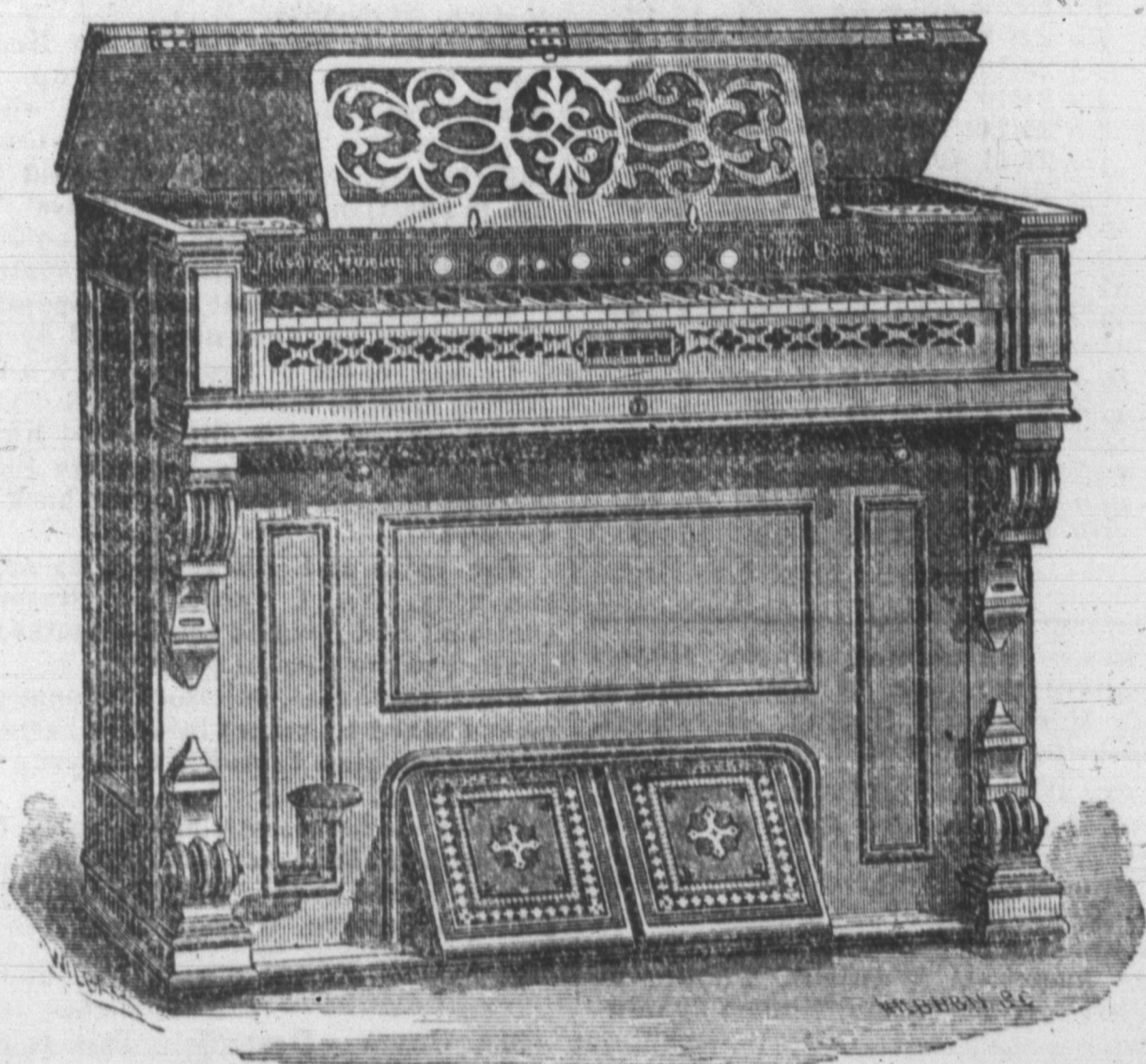

With two sets of Vibrators throughout, one of four feet pitch, one of eight feet; Improved VOX HUMANA; AUTOMATIC SWELL; Self-adjusting Reed-Valves; Improved Bellows; Foot-Swell; Ivory fronts to Keys; Clothed Mortises; Lamp Stands, &c.

With an instrument having this attachment, if a tune written in the key of G be found too high for the voices, the performer can at a single movement shift his key-board, and so lower the pitch a whole or half-step or tone; if the singers really singing in the key of G flat or F, while the player still plays as if in G.

Taken from one cut in an Emerald by command of Tiberius Caesar and which was given from the Treasury of Constantinople, by the Emperor of the Turks, to Pope Innocent VIII, for the Redemption of his Brother, then a Captive to the Christians.

The following Extract, in proof of the Authenticity of the above Portrait, is translated from the Latin contemporary Historians of the period.

"News to the Senate of Rome concerning Jesus CHRIST in the days of Tiberius Caesar the Emperor, as the governors of sundry provinces under the Senate and people of Rome used to advertise the Senate of such news as chanced in diverse countries.

"Publius Lentulus, being at that time president in Judaea, wrote an epistle to the Senate and people of Rome, the words whereof were these:—

"There appeared in these our days a man of great virtue, named Jesus CHRIST, who is yet alive amongst us, and of the gentiles is accepted for a Prophet of Truth, but his own disciples called him the Son of God. He raiseth the dead and cureth all manner of diseases. A man of stature somewhat tall and comely, with a very reverend countenance, such as the beholders may both love and fear; his hair of the colour of phibert full ripe, and plain almost down to his ears; but from the ears downward somewhat curled, and more orient of colour, waving on his shoulders. In the midst of his head goeth a sea, or partition of his hair, after the manner of the Nazarites; his forehead, very plain and smooth; his face, without spot or wrinkle, beautified with a comely red; his nose and mouth so formed as nothing can be reprehended; his beard somewhat thick agreeable in colour to the hair of his head, not of any great length, in the midst of an innocent and mature look; his eyes grey, clear and quick. In reproving, he is terrible; in admonishing, courteous and fair-spoken; pleasant in speech, mixed with gravity. It cannot be remembered that any have seen him laugh, but many have seen him weep. In proportion of body, well-shaped and straight; his hands and arms right, and disceivable to behold; in speaking, very temperate, modest and wise. A man for singular beauty surpassing the children of men."

PARTIES intending to make application to Parliament for Private Bills, either for granting exclusive privileges, or conferring corporate powers for commercial or other purposes of profit, or for doing anything tending to affect the rights or property of other parties, are hereby notified that they are required by the 51st and following Rules of the House of Commons (which are published in full in the "Canadian Gazette") to give TWO MONTHS NOTICE of the application (clearly and distinctly specifying its nature and object), in the "Canadian Gazette," and also in a newspaper published in the County or Union of Counties affected, sending copies of the first and last of such notices to the Private Bill Office.

All Petitions for Private Bills must be presented within the first three weeks of the Session.
