

Scott performed an extensive tour in New Brunswick, in which he, as usual, obeyed the Saviour's injunction, "As ye go, preach."

After his return, the church in Charlottetown being destitute of a Pastor, he accepted a call to the pastorate, and removed thither in March, 1850. In his field, however, were likewise embraced Lot 49 and St. Peter's Road.

On the 25th of June, 1852, he and his "beloved Clementine Charlotte" left Prince Edward Island, and travelled with their own conveyance through parts of New Brunswick, Maine, Vermont, and Massachusetts to Boston.

On the 28th of July he commenced his labors in New Castle, Miramichi. There also his efforts for the building of a commodious Meeting House were successful: and, with the assistance of Rev. D. McPhail, he formed a Church.

In this diligent and faithful manner he laboured in these parts, aiding destitute Churches—he assisted in building a Meeting House at North Esk—and publishing the gospel in the regions beyond, for three years and six months.

Nov. 3, 1856, he left New Brunswick, and performed an extensive tour in Nova Scotia, during which, by request, he tarried and preached four months in Liverpool.

Bro. Scott subsequently complied with an invitation from the N. S. Home Missionary Board to labor in Walton and Maitland. While laboring usefully there, and afterwards, he aided greatly, by collecting funds, &c., in the building of a Meeting House at Walton.

According to his Memoranda, in compliance with a unanimous call from the Baptist Church of Onslow, he assumed the pastorate, April 13, 1858—resigned in 1866—resumed his labors in 1867; and entered on the pastorate of the Church of Onslow East, also by a unanimous call, in 1868.

Our Brother's last illness was short. He had been indisposed, and, apprehensive of his approaching dissolution, had made the best arrangements in his power for the comfort of his affectionate and beloved wife, in the event of her surviving him.

FORT GARRY, AUG. 21.—An express from Edmonston brings the intelligence that a number of citizens of the United States have arrived there, carrying liquor to trade with the Indians.

Cuban agents are at work in Montreal endeavouring to enlist men to serve in Cuban army. The Governor General of Canada has issued a proclamation of warning in consequence.

MONTREAL, AUG. 23.—The Very Rev. Dean Bithune, Episcopal clergyman of this city, died yesterday morning, aged 81.

A fearful thunder storm occurred yesterday morning. Four men were struck by lightning but not killed.

OTTAWA.—Mr. J. S. Nickerson of St. Mary Ann's Bay, and W. T. Frost of Digby, are appointed Fishery Officers. Benjamin Rynard, of Geston's Cove is appointed sub-collector in the Customs.

John Morish of Lunenburg, is appointed Preventive Officer in Customs.

UNITED STATES. A Washington despatch announces that a gross sum will probably be awarded our Government, and that the matter will not go before a Board of Commissioners.

Four more yellow fever ships entered the harbor Sunday night.

Prince Augustus of Saxe Coburg, husband of the Princess Imperial of Brazil, arrived in New York yesterday on a pleasure trip.

Active measures are being taken by the United States and Great Britain for the suppression of the slave trade on the East Coast of Africa.

The New York Republicans nominated Gen. Dix for Governor. His nomination takes the politicians by surprise; but it is acquiesced in, as the strongest that could possibly have been made.

There were seventy-four sun strokes yesterday, Aug. 23rd, of which four were fatal.

A heavy thunder storm took place at Long Branch, and several boats with fishing parties have not been heard from.

A Barge with three hundred excursionists was struck by lightning at Hartford, Conn., on Thursday, and thirty people were prostrated by the stroke.

Obstructions on the track of the Chicago, Clinton and Dubuque Railroad threw the train from the track yesterday, killing 2 persons and smashing up the cars.

Martial Law. Disturbances are now occurring in Ulster County.

Geneva Arbitrators met yesterday. It is hinted that the doings of the Board will soon be made public.

Aug 21.—Belfast is not yet quiet, although various prisoners conveyed to jail by troops were safely lodged without an attempt at rescue.

The London firm of Messrs. Gladstone & Co., large East India and China merchants, in first-class standing, have failed. Liabilities £2,000,000 sterling.

Aug 23.—No disturbance occurred in Belfast last night. The military continue to occupy the street, and stringent regulations are still in force.

Great excitement exists in Drogheda. An outbreak is momentarily feared there. The military are confined to the Barracks.

Belfast continues quiet. The Mayor has ordered all public houses to remain closed until Tuesday. The value of property destroyed by the mob is estimated at 50,000 pounds.

A steamship from Capetown arrived at Southampton. The news from diamond fields is very favourable. Large numbers of precious stones continue to be found.

Aug 26.—Advices received from Belfast by Government state that everything is quiet, and that the reinforcements of troops are leaving, there being no apprehension whatever of further trouble.

Geneva, Aug 26.—There has been an earnest contest between the British and American Counsel before the Board of Arbitration, regarding the case of the privateer "Shenandoah." It is said that the case of the "Georgia" has been practically abandoned by American Counsel.

FRANCE.—Paris.—The steaming Panama which sailed from St Nazair on the 15th, was lost in a storm off the Spanish coast near Santander. Passengers and crew saved.

The Prince of Wales has gone on a yachting excursion to the coast of France. He arrived at Trouville, where he was cordially received by Mr. Thiers. The reception was entirely informal. Thiers and the Prince promenaded on the beach.
