Scott performed an extensive tour in New Brunswick, in which he, as usual, obeyed the Saviour's injunction, " As ye go, preach."

After his return, the church in Charlotte. town being destitute of a Pastor, he accepted a call to the pastorate, and removed thither in March, 1850. In his field, however, were likewise embraced Lot 49 and St. Peter's Road. After laboring thus about two years, though some degree of success evidently attended his ministry, yet he was desirous to travel abroad. The churches were averse to his departure ; but the separation was effected with mutual expressions of good will. Just before his departure ten persons were baptized by him, and added to the Church at Lot. '49, and one restored.

On the 25th of June, 1852, he and his " beloved Clementine Charlotte" left Prince Edward Island, and travelled with their own conveyance through parts of New Brunswick, Maine, Vermont, and Massachusetts to Boston. In the parts of the United States through which they passed, some things pleased them; but, on the whole, they preferred the British Provinces. Having returned to St. John, N. B., on the 15th of October, Bro. Scott accepted an invitation from the Church in Portland to labor with them till the next Spring. He then entered the service of the N. B. Baptist Home Missionary Board, and, as their Agent, visited a number of Churches belonging to the Eastern Association. As it seemed peculiarly desirable to establish an interest in Shediac, he collected a considerable amount toward the erection of a place of Worship there ; and aided in carrying this object into effect. On the 31st of May, 1853, he and Rev. Jas. Newcomb organized a small Church in Shediac. On the 28th of July he commenced his labors in New Castle, Miramichi. There also his efforts for the building of a commodious Meeting House were successful and, with the assistance of Rev. D. Mc-Phail, he formed a Church. Besides these useful labors, he states that during the year he visited and preached at some twenty different places, delivered 136 discourses, made 495 religious family visits, held 12 conference and 16 prayer meetings, baptized 2 persons, delivered 2 lectures on Temperance, and circulated 3000 pages of tracts and religious papers. In this diligent and faithful manner he laboured in these parts, aiding destitute Churches-he assisted in building a Meeting House at North Esk-and publishing the gospel in the regions beyond, for three years and six months. His labours in these regions, as he remarked, seemed mostly preparatory ; but they were none the less useful.

Nov. 3, 1856, he left New Brunswick, and performed an extensive tour in Nova Scotia, during which, by request, he tarried and preached four months in Liverpool.

Bro. Scott subsequently complied with an invitation from the N. S. Home Missionary Board to labor in Walton and Maitland. While laboring usefully there, and afterwards, he aided greatly, by collecting funds, &c., in the building of a Meeting House at Walton. In this labor of love he appears to have assisted materially in seven different places ; and to have taken an active part in the organization of five Churches.

According to his Memoranda, in compliance with a unanimous call from the ~ Baptist Church of Onslow, he assumed the pastorate, April 13, 1858-resigned in 1866-resumed his labors in 1867; and entered on the pastorate of the Church of Onslow East, also by a unanimous call, in 1868. Without entering into particulars, it may suffice to say, such a divine blessing attended his labors in Onslow, that it was his privilege to baptize 93 persons there. Our Brother's last illness was short. He had been indisposed, and, apprehensive of his approaching dissolution, had made the best arrangements in his power for the comfort of his affectionate and beloved wife, in the event of her surviving him. But on Sabbath, April 28th, he travelled several miles, and preached from 1 Cor. xv. 2. About 7 o'clock that evening he became very ill, and so continued till his decease, which took place on Wednesday, May 1st, 1872, when he was nearly 64 years of age. His mental faculties continued bright to the last. A little before his departure he said, " All is well-1 am going home-heaven-happy." Through rich grace it may be said of our departed Brother, as of Barnabas, " He was a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost and of faith : and much people was added unto the Lord."


